Sloux County Stockman Believes Prices Will Come Down and There Will Be Plenty of Stock on Market.

I believe prices were boosted by the ackers to encourage the raising of more cattle in the west," said W. J. McGiney of Harrison, Sloux County, in Omaha, Mr. McGinley is a cattleman whose interests extend in both northwestern Nerasks and part of South Dakota.

"I don't think it was really necessar; or the packers to pay 9 and 10 cents for cattle this fall," he said, "and I believe when the ranchmen raise a good supply again these prices will come down. While cattle are somewhat scarce, I have no dea that the law of supply and demand BULGARIAN ATTACK operated to force the price up to 9 and 10 cents. High prices have thrown scare into the consumer and have made the rancher get busy with more improved nethods of raising stock.

Great Changes Coming. 'Within the next ten years the west s going to see a great change in the cattle raising industry. Improved nethods are rapidly coming in and I beleve in a few years we will be raising us much beef as ever. Some of the great ranch interests are now rapidly being sold out and the large ranchmen are quitting business. The Kinkald homestead law, allowing farmers to take secions of land, has done it largely, but this is no real detriment to the cattle business. Men who have homesteaded these tracts and who buy other tracts om the large ranchers are going into the cattle business in a new way. They are rapidly introducing better bred cattle. The losses will be far less.


