ROURKE STRONG FOR CHICAGO

Pa Opposes Transferring Western League Headquarters.

EXPRESSES THE COMMON VIEW

O'Nelli Would Resign and League Would Lose Advantage of Contact with the Center of Base Ball World.

Pa Rourke, owner and president of the Omaha base ball club, returned vesterday morning from Milwaukee, where he attended the annual meeting of the minor league base ball clubs. Following that meeting he went to Chicago, where the Western league magnates held a meet-

At the Western league meeting it was decided by resolution to move the Western league headquarters from Chicago and bring them to Omaha. Bill Rourke yesterday afternoon said he did not want the headquarters brought to Omaha and at the meeting in Chleago voted against it.

In speaking of the next annual meeting of the minor league clubs going to Columbus, Pa Rourke said the American association had the controlling number of votes to defeat Omaba. Rourke, when asked if the meeting in 1914 would come to Omaha, said he did not know, but that he is not thinking of making a fight for it. He says the three Class A leagues have the controlling votes in the meeting and that they could hold the meeting anywhere they wanted to, and it would be of no use to try and get the convention unless the American association wanted to send it here. In the Kansas Aggie game, in the Belleveue contest and in the Doane exhibition, Nebraska chalked up as many points as it liked. But in the Missouri, the Minnesota and the Kansas games it did not register in the third quarter Flanagan kicked many points. The players who were used in them did some of the best work that was done in this section of the country last fall They fought hard, they studied their positions, and they made themselves powerful cogs in a machine that was well oiled and that really outplayed the strong Wolverine band. The offense of last fall n the Minnesota game was a joke; in the Missouri game it was effective only because the Cornhuskers could turn the ends for long gains; in the Kansas game t scored heavily, because the Kansas ends and backs were very weak. In the Ames game it could do very little; it met defense that was strong. There were no plays which would gain ground well. Purdy was the only man on the team who could advance the ball for any con-

distent marches. Coach Williams beats Nebraska each fall at Minneapolis because he knows that the Cornhuskers never have a powerful scoring machine and builds his style accordingly. He knows that if he can score once or twice he has the Cornhuskers licked. He nearly always scores. too, and the Cornbuskers are always licked. He had better material this fall than Nebraska. Men like Purdy, Halligan, Allan, Frank, Towle, Swanson and Howard are among some of the best foot ball material in the west. If Purdy were in the hands of a Yale or Princetor coach, he would be one of the best backs in the country. Halligan would be his equal under the same conditions. Towle would be a wonderful quarter, too. Allan and Swanson would be remarkable line-
