Pa Opposes Transferring Western League Headquarters.

EXPRESSES THE COMMON VIEW

O'Neill Would Resign and League Would Lose Advantage of Contact with the Center of Base Ball World.

Pa Rourke, owner and president of the Omaha base ball club, returned yesterday morning from Milwaukee, where he attended the annual meeting of the minor league base ball clubs.

At the Western league meeting it was decided by resolution to move the Western league headquarters from Chicago and bring them to Omaha.

Mr. Rourke had little to say on the proposition of transferring the Western league headquarters.

Rourke is Right.

Many Omaha and other Western league fans think Rourke is right in not wanting to bring the headquarters here.

Anyone who is impartial and has followed the affairs and destinies of the Western league for a number of years will admit that "Tip" O'Neill has done more for this league than any other president it ever had.

Taking the proposition of the moving of the league headquarters from Chicago, in the first place in many respects it would be folly.

The Western league offices being in Chicago, the heart of the base ball world, gives the league a standing. The league

The writer really believes the reason Nebraska did not play better foot ball yesterday is the same reason which kept them from winning at Missouri; that held them to seven points at Missouri—they do not have a strong offensive machine.

Belmonts Defeat Columbian Squad

The Belmonts defeated the Columbians yesterday afternoon at Rourke park by the score of 3 to 0.

Never since the days of "Bummy" Booth has Nebraska had a consistent ground-gaining machine.

Only one time, since the days of Booth, have the Cornhuskers displayed great offensive foot ball, and that was in the Michigan game of last season.
