

FOR SOCIAL SERVICE BOARD

Commissioners Recommend for Passage Ordinance Creating It. BOARD TO HAVE FIVE MEMBERS. Each Must Give Bond and Work Without Pay—Two Members to Be Women—To Be Named by the Commission.

By a unanimous vote yesterday the city commission recommended the ordinance creating a social service board for passage. Several speakers—Mrs. C. W. Hayes, Mrs. Draper Smith, Rev. J. W. Stenson, Rabbi Frederick Cohn, John C. Wharton, John B. Hammond, Rev. H. J. Kirschtien, Charles A. Allen and James C. Johnson—were present to make speeches in favor of the ordinance, but the council refused to hear their arguments and proceeded at once to recommend the ordinance for passage. It will come up for final action one week from Tuesday.

This ordinance creates a social service board of five members, two of whom shall be women, to be elected by the council and to hold office during the term of the commission that elects them, unless the office of any member be declared vacant by the commission. The members are to serve without pay. Each must give bond in the sum of \$1,000 for the faithful performance of duty.

Twice each month the board must hold a public meeting. Members who fail to attend these meetings for two consecutive times forfeit their membership. Duties of the Board. The duty of the board shall be: "To inspect and investigate all places of public amusement and to take all necessary steps to enforce any and all ordinances of the city and laws of the state of Nebraska to prevent the carrying on of any amusement or entertainment which has a tendency to impair or destroy the good morals of the community, or the running of any place of amusement where health, comfort and safety of the patrons and employees of such places are not properly protected. It shall investigate and advise moral and social conditions in all places in the community, especially where young persons are concerned, and shall consider in connection therewith the health, comfort and well-being of such persons."

It is further ordered that the board shall render assistance to other organizations working toward a similar end. The members "must strive as far as possible to prevent the publication of the name or offense of any juvenile offender, or any reference thereto in such a manner that the name of the offender will become known to the public." The board must report to the mayor and council in writing "from time to time" with recommendations. Each member will upon demand be given free access to any place, room or building wherein public exhibition, amusement or entertainment is being held. Each member shall be commissioned a special police officer.

Committees Planning B'nai B'rith Affair

A meeting of the committee on arrangements for the coming B'nai B'rith celebration was held at the home of Henry Moskowitz on Sunday morning. From the encouraging reports of the various subcommittees the decided success of a most interesting program was assured. Chairman Charles Elgutter announced that owing to greater facilities for handling the large crowd expected the afternoon meeting for members of the three lodges of Omaha and Council Bluffs would be held in the regular hall of Nebraska lodge in the Continental block. The arrangements for this special meeting were left to a special committee composed of the president of the three lodges—Dr. Philip Sber of Nebraska lodge, R. J. Leon of McKinley lodge and Jacob Simon of Council Bluffs. Judge Rosenfeld announced that interest in the affair in Council Bluffs was acute and that a large delegation might be expected from there. Definite arrangements were made for the reception and entertainment of the visiting brethren. This is to consist of a committee which will arrange for automobiles at the depots, for a breakfast at the hotel and rides about the city to places of interest. A luncheon will be held on Sunday at noon at the Loyal hotel and the most prominent Jews of the three cities are expected to attend.

Gifford to Testify in Dynamite Cases

Ward C. Gifford, assistant commissioner of the Commercial club, will be a prominent witness in the dynamite conspiracy case at Indianapolis November 21. He has been served with summons to appear in the district court in that city by United States Marshal Warner of Omaha. Gifford secured some inside information about dynamiting in Kansas City while a reporter for the Kansas City Post. He secured interviews from the business agent of the Structural Iron Workers' union of Kansas City, and some of the men who later have been found directly implicated in placing bombs throughout the country, before the men had been "advised" by their attorneys. His testimony may be used, he says, to connect the actions of the men on trial with orders from the "higher ups."

POLICE SEEK POISONER OF DUCKS AND CHICKENS

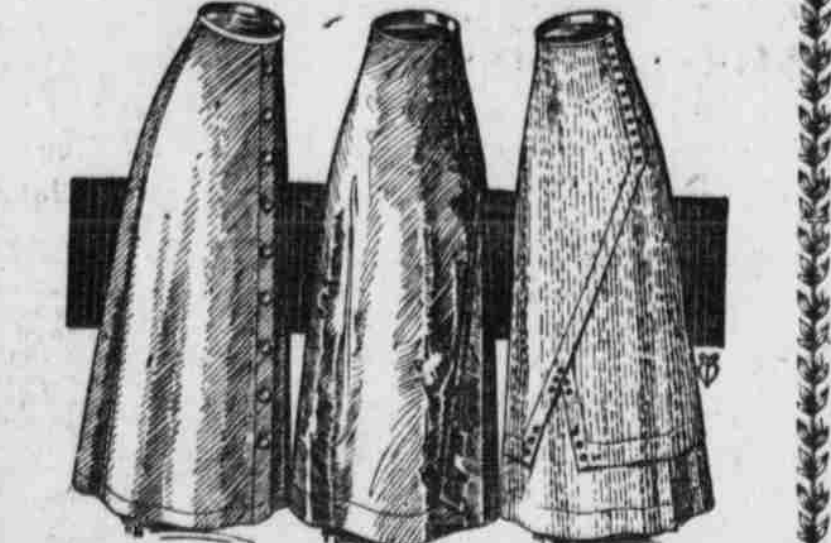

NO INCREASE IN SALOONS

Commissioner Ryder Says No New Licenses Will Be Issued. COMMISSIONERS BACK HIM UP. City Council Has Agreed that the Present 240 Saloons Are Enough for Omaha—Many Requests Refused.

There will be no increase next year in the number of saloons in the city, as the commissioners are unanimous in opposing the granting of new licenses. Numerous applications for licenses have been received by Police Commissioner Ryder, to whom they were referred by the other commissioners, and the same answer has been made to all applicants. "Requests have been made for licenses to operate saloons at Nineteenth and Harney, in 'auto row,' on North Twenty-fourth street and on Vinton street," said Mr. Ryder, "and in one instance I recall the applicant secured an option on property, which option he lost. It is only fair to us to state that the number of saloons will not be increased next year." There are now 240 saloons in Omaha. The commission has been requested for permits to transfer locations, and these transfers are being granted when there is no objection to the new location.

JAPANESE TEA MERCHANT SAYS CROP IS BOUNTIFUL

John Kamuro, tea merchant and recognized head of the tea trust of Japan, with offices in Tokio, was a west bound passenger on Northwestern-Union Pacific No. 1, enroute home from New York, where he sold 1,000,000 acres of this year's crop of tea to brokers. Mr. Kamuro says the tea crop of Japan this year is the best in the history of the country, but that, nevertheless, present prices will be maintained. He describes Japan as having almost entirely recovered from the effects of the war with Russia a few years ago, much of the debt having been paid off and the country enjoying an era of great prosperity.
