### FREMONT LAWYERS WRANGLE

Cook Accuses Britton and Dolezal  
of Changing Exhibit.

### BLOOD SPOTS FOUND IN GRIP

State Treasurer George Finally Dis-  
poses of His Bond Among Surety  
Company—Governor Visits  
His Home City.

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 19.—(Special.)—An attempt to have his successor in the county attorney's office cited by the supreme court, with another attorney, for contempt of court on a charge of falsifying an exhibit in the case against Louis Rogers, for infanticide, was made by County Attorney J. C. Cook of Dodge county, before the supreme bench today. He asked the supreme court to investigate. The hearing will be continued until

the accused attorneys have time to prepare their case.  
F. W. Button, county attorney-elect of Dodge county, and Frank Dolezal, both of Fremont, are the men whom Cook charges with seeking to deceive and mislead the court. He alleges that "for purposes of obtaining justice" the two men have caused to be placed in a hand grip, which figured as evidence, spots of some substance resembling blood, and that this was done since the trial of the case occurred in court.  
Rogers is accused of having killed a babe born to a woman with whom he was traveling. The grip containing the body was found in the handgrip at Colton. The defense sought to prove that the baby was killed at a hospital in Omaha and later the body was brought to Dodge county in the grip.  
Cook declares that the "grip" was "doctored" and that the two men were responsible for it. Mr. Burton's brief now declares that the evidence has been brought to light, which shows that the babe was born in a bath room in the Morris hotel in Omaha. Button also ac-

serts that the grip is now in a battered condition, which was caused by the officers for the prosecution. Button also says for the defense that it was they "forced its unwilling production" by the state.  
Cook insists that the bloodspots were placed on the grip after its arrival in Dodge county and asks that a committee be appointed to investigate. Messrs. Button and Dolezal were present in the supreme court Tuesday, when the Cook motion was presented. The court gave them five days in which to make a counter proposal.  
**Surety Bond Disposed Of.**  
Eleven surety companies will share in the \$5,000 premium to be paid by the state of Nebraska on the \$1,000,000 bond to be furnished for State Treasurer George, during the next two years. Mr. George has apportioned the amounts as follows: American Surety company and National Surety company, \$150,000 each. Fidelity and Deposit, American Bonding, Lion Bonding and Surety, Equitable and Aetna, \$100,000 each. Maryland Casualty, Title Guarantee and Surety, Massachusetts Bonding and Indemnity and Globe, \$50,000 each.  
On the \$150,000 allotments the premium will be \$750 each. On the \$100,000 shares, \$500 each, and on the \$50,000 shares, \$250 each.  
The state treasurer has been solicited by several different companies for larger shares of the bond on the plea that they assisted him during the campaign. He announced, however, that the above allotment will be final.

BROKEN BOW, Neb., Nov. 19.—(Special.)—Curwin Honeywell, the 17-year-old printer, who was charged with holding up Norm Parks, former editor of the Custer County Republican, and his mother at the point of a gun, compelling them to pay over a certain sum of money which he alleged was due him for burning the Republican office at the instigation of Parks, was taken before Judge Hostetler in district court today. Honeywell was allowed by the county attorney to plead guilty to assault. He was fined \$25 and the costs of the trial. ### Central City Man, Naval Shipwright, Killed in Shanghai

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Nathan E. Willis, a shipwright, who enlisted in the navy from Central City, Neb., was killed ashore in Shanghai yesterday by a foreign man-of-warman, according to a cablegram to the Navy department today from Admiral Nicholson, commander in chief of the Asiatic fleet. The killing is under investigation by a board composed of American and foreign naval officers.

### CHARGES FILED AGAINST TWO FREMONT LAWYERS

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 19.—(Special Telegram.)—County Attorney J. C. Cook of Dodge county filed a motion in the supreme court this morning, charging F. W. Button and Frank Dolezal, attorneys for Louis Rogers, convicted of infanticide, with tampering with exhibits now before the supreme court. He asked for investigation of the charges, requesting the court to appoint a committee. The court gave the attorneys until Monday to make a counter showing and the prosecution will likewise be allowed five days to reply.  
Cook claims that a grip used as an exhibit in the case has been altered. Cook was bull mooser-republican candidate for congress in the Third district, while F. W. Button was elected county attorney to succeed Cook.
