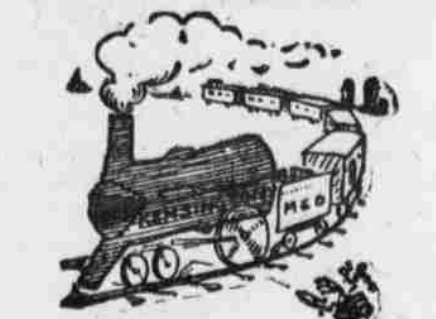

Ames Foot Ball Team Will Not Play Any Post Season Games AMES, Ia., Nov. 19.—(Special).—Ames will not meet Nebraska in a post season foot ball contest for Missouri valley foot ball championship. Nebraska won its two contests with Missouri and Kansas. Ames defeated Missouri several weeks ago and will very likely defeat Drake, which succumbed to Missouri and Grinnell, both of whom Ames defeated with ease. The Ames authorities have always opposed post-season games of any sort on the ground that foot ball should be played for sport's sake and not for championship's sake. This is entirely in sympathy with the majority of the Missouri Valley conference, who do not even officially award a championship. Prof. Boyer emphasized this in a statement last night. "Under no circumstances will Ames play a post-season game this year or in the future." This leaves the Missouri valley title in doubt, and unless Drake defeats Ames Saturday, Nebraska and Ames will be tied for first place. Nebraska, as usual, is coming forward with a statement claiming a clear title on the ground of having defeated the weakling Kansas team and the Missouri team that Ames ran over to a tune of 29 to 6. Ames, of course, was defeated by Iowa, 29 to 7, and is out of the running for the state title, but this game had no more bearing on the Missouri valley conference than a game with Yale.
