Commissioners Refuse to Treat with Contractors Till All Bills Are In.

SEVERAL DISPUTES HAVE ARISEN

Summarily halting negotiations for a settlement with Caldwell & Drake, county building general contractors, the Board of County Commissioners gave the contractors notice that there will be no further treating until there has been compliance with the board's request for a statement of all claims against the county.

The "extras" bill was for \$12,966.24. The board knows the general contractors are withholding their claims. They refuse to go further with the negotiations for a settlement until they know exactly what the contractors will demand.
