

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Nov. 26 - With the first big fight of the American Fedration of Labor convention, that of the Sherman anti-trust law, temporarily disposed of, the convention today took up the subject of organization by industries rather than by trades. The debate is expected to bring about a sharp division etween the radical and conservative wings of the convention.

The federation has always been unalterably opposed to industrial unionism, but this year the radical faction has forced a fight on the convention floor. onservatives, headed by President Compers, say that the adoption of the injustrial plan would be only a step toward changing the federation into another olitical party

At the presentation of the minority re ort of the committee, which favors industrial unionism, the convention floor secame a scene of excitement. As soon as President Compers called for the vote and before remarks had been allowed, a dozen men were on their feet calling for recognition. Gompers recognized one delegate, who was against industrial nionism, saying: "I am pleased to see that at last you are waking up.

FIGHTING STOPS FOR MOMENT BETWEEN BULGARS AND TURKS

All the reports emanating from Turkish sources alleging that the Turkish troops had gained victories over the at Tchatalia are officially declared untrue by the Bulgarian war office today.

This is the only information given out thus far in regard to the three days' operations of the Bulgarian army before Constantinople with the exception of yeshad been engaged at the advance points

Regarding the situation at Adrianople, official accounts state that the Turkish troops attempting to break through the Bulgarian investing lines were repulsed on Monday with heavy losses after a battle lasting the whole day. They were compelled to retire to the fortress. From Dedeaghatch, on the Agean sea, it is reported that two buttalions of Turkish troops posted on the heights to the north were routed by the Bulgarians. The Turks fled, leaving a train filled with provisions, mmunition and horses.

Bulgaria Names Conditions Bulgaria's conditions for agreeing to an armistice were transmitted to Constantinople yesterday. They were accompanied by Bulgaria's main conditions for the conlusion of peace, the principal stipulation of which permits Turkey to retain the city of Constantinople and a strip of coast territory in Europe.
