

GUN MEN WILL BE SENTENCED

Four Convicted of Murder Will Be Taken to Sing Sing Nov. 26.

THEIR PEDIGREES ARE TAKEN

All Are Under Thirty Years of Age and Have Jail Records—Rose, Vallon, Webber and Schepps to Be Released.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—Sentence of death on the four gunmen convicted yesterday of murdering Herman Rosenthal will be pronounced by Justice Goff on November 26, he announced today when the prisoners were arraigned before him. After sentence is passed the men will be taken to Sing Sing, where former Police Lieutenant Charles Becker is awaiting death for investigating the shooting.

Pedigrees Taken.
The pedigrees of the gunmen were taken today at their arraignment. "Whitely" Lewis said his real name was Frank Sedenacue, born in Russia, 24 years old, and a bookbinder by trade. Both his parents are living and he has served two jail sentences.

"Dago Frank" gave his correct name as Frank Crofied, 23 years old, a native of Italy, and a steam fitter by occupation. He has served one jail term and described himself as a moderate drinker. "Lafay Louie" said he was christened Louis Rosenberg, was 21 years old, a native of Austria, and married. His vocation was salesmanship, he said; he was temperate and had served one jail sentence.

"Cly the Blood" was recorded as Harry Horowitz, a clerk, 24 years old, a native of New York City, married and temperate.

Release State Witnesses.
The state's informers, Rose, Vallon, Webber and Schepps, who have been held in prison during the trial, probably will be released this afternoon. The district attorney agreed today that there was no further need of keeping them behind the bars. It is thought they will leave the city. William Shapiro, driver of the "murder car," and jointly indicted with the gunmen and Becker, also will go free. In return for his testimony for the state, the district attorney's office will move that the indictment against him be quashed.

Of the seven indicted for the Rosenthal murder, this leaves but one defendant to be tried. He is Jack Sullivan, "king of the newsboys."
Joseph A. Shay, attorney for Charles Becker, filed with District Attorney Whitman today notice of appeal from the verdict of the jury which convicted his client of procuring the murder of Herman Rosenthal. The notice acts as a stay of execution.

In another section of the penal code the sending of poisons through the mails is expressly forbidden.
One of the men accused is said to have been the secretary of the Board of Health in the city of his residence. He responded. It is said, to a decoy or test letter sent to him by the inspectors on the stationery of the Board of Health. He has been indicted according to the reports received by the postoffice inspectors.

are ordered arrested, and in this class it is said many indictments already have been returned.

How Inspectors Worked.

As showing the difficulties encountered the following case is cited by those who conducted the inquiry.
Interviews of the physicians with many of these practitioners indicated clearly that they knew they were violating the law and were treating upon dangerous ground. In Chicago an inspector called upon a physician after having received from him a response by mail to his decoy letter. The inspector professed a desire to engage the doctor's services. The doctor was cautious and the inspector was called upon to show the letter he had received. It was in the physician's own hand writing. Evidently suspicious, he snatched the letter from the inspector's hand, tore it twice across and threw it into the waste basket. Subsequently the inspector returned to the office in the temporary absence of the doctor, secured the strips from the basket and pasted them together. That letter constitutes an important link in the chain of evidence on which that doctor was indicted.

It is the expressed determination of the postal authorities to put an end to the promotion by mail of criminal practices, one of the traffic in drugs and instruments upon which a ban is placed by the law. Postmaster General Hitchcock said today that every case against an alleged violator of the law would be pressed vigorously and every effort made to send the culprit, if convicted, to the penitentiary.

Prominent Persons Arrested.

CHICAGO, Nov. 20.—Ten arrests were made today by postal inspectors in a nation-wide movement against doctors and persons advertising methods conducive to race suicide. It was declared today that the raids were made simultaneously all over the country. The specific charges against the persons arrested is under the mails in connection with a business under the ban of the government.

Among those arrested by the Chicago postal inspectors were George T. Ledell, Arnold E. F. Hasenclever, Margaret Livingston, J. L. O. Trudel, Osgood E. Billings, J. J. Milasch, W. D. Munn, Fannie Brin and Annie Masonick of Chicago.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Nov. 20.—Writs of capias were served on the Cahoon-Lyon Drug company and Faxon, Williams & Faxon, grocers and druggists, today, in the postoffice crusade. Both concerns are large corporations with branches throughout the city.

Answers Decoy Letter.

Dr. Pribbenow received a letter purporting to be from Olga Severson of Plandreau, S. D. Dr. Pribbenow answered the letter and went into detail regarding the medicines he sold with the prices. Inspector Handall sent for the medicines from Plandreau and will use them in evidence.

Dr. Dibern received his letter under the name of Dr. Babcock who had offices across from Dr. Dibern. He said Babcock left town some time ago and told Dibern to open his mail and answer. Dibern answered letters addressed to Babcock adding the following postscript to one letter: "I wish we could talk it over; letter writing is very dangerous." (Signed) "D." These men will be given preliminary hearings this week before Commissioner Daniel.

Council Bluffs Druggist.

J. A. Clark, a leading druggist of Council Bluffs, was also caught in the sweeping operations of the federal officials. He was arrested on complaint filed with United States Commissioner Sapp on October 14 and his case was continued until Thursday.

BLUFFS MAN TO MAKE FIGHT

Arrest of J. A. Clark Causes Surprise Across River.

The arrest of J. A. Clark as one of the victims in the big round up created some interest in Council Bluffs, for Mr. Clark is one of the most prominent druggists of the city, with a fashionable store located on Broadway in the busiest center of the city. He was arrested by Deputy United States Marshal W. A. Gronsweg near the middle of the day and taken before United States Commissioner W. F. Sapp in the federal building, where he filed a bond of \$500 for his appearance for a hearing in the office of the commissioner at 10 o'clock this morning.

Mr. Clark's technical violation of the postal laws was brought about by his connection with the sale of the alleged objectionable goods a number of months ago when the representative of a big eastern rubber factory solicited his order. He declined at first to handle the article, which has been extensively advertised in the big magazines of the country and the daily papers for many years. As a final inducement the agents of the company agreed to expend \$50 advertising in a Council Bluffs paper, and upon this proposition a consignment was accepted to be sold on commission.

A month or more ago a letter was received purporting to come from Madge J. Carter, who gave the postoffice address of "box 31, Limon, Colo.," in which she said she had seen the advertisement in the Council Bluffs paper and asking a number of questions and making some statements concerning herself which might have made her letter unmailable. Mr. Clark replied to the letter in the usual business manner. It was evidently a decoy letter. It was used as the basis of an information filed here on October 14, and the warrant withheld until yesterday. Mr. Clark engaged counsel yesterday and will make a stiff fight.

Twenty-Four Animals and 6,000 Bushels of Grain Destroyed

TEKAMAH, Neb., Nov. 20.—(Special.)—This morning about 3 o'clock a large barn on one of the farms of the late Congressman James E. Latta was destroyed by fire. The barn is located on the north farm about seven miles north of Tekamah. When the fire was discovered by the occupants of the house the roof was ready to fall in. Ten head of males and fourteen head of horses and colts were burned to death. In addition the combination corn crib and granary was consumed. It was about 2,000 bushels of corn and about the same amount of wheat. The principal granary of the Lattas was on the south farm, a half mile distant. In that was stored all their fall wheat crop. There was insurance on nothing except the barn. No cause can be assigned for the fire unless it was the carelessness of some one smoking around the barn. The ranch is under the active management of Burr Latta, the younger of the two sons left by the late Mr. Latta.
