Little to Be Gained.

braskans through entering the "Big The rules which govern the students who engage in athletics for these schools are fully as obnoxious as those in the Missouri Valley conference; indeed, many of them are worse, and really are so silly that Michigan a few years ago pulled out. Nebraska's natural position makes it imperative that it should Kansas, Ames, Missouri, Drake and Iowa. It does not need to look to Wisconsin. liffnois, Chicago, Michigan or any other member of the "Big Nine." There is plenty f stiff opposition in the local division, and so long as the Cornbuskers can stick in this conference and be the leaders they should not complain. That is the view many grads and undergraduates take of the situation. Nebraska is the big frog in the Missouri valley puddie: what it would be in the Western conference no one can tell. There is little doubt, however, that it would be superior each fall to all schools with the possible exception of Chicago, Minneaota, Wisconsin and Illinois; while it would always a hard proposition for any of these schools. The Cornhuskers always work the Gophers to the limit. For three years they licked the Illini each Thanksgiving.

Not Lacking Games. But even if Nebraska is the equal or almost the equal of the best in the "Big Nine," it would gain nothing except a little newspaper flattery through enter ing the large body. It can get all the games it wants with "Big Nine" elevents Each fall the Cornbuskers play Minnesota, usually the leader of the large organization, and it can arrange at least ne other game if it chooses. Two "Big Nine" contests and games with Ames, Kansas, Missouri, Drake and two minor achools afford all the foot ball menu the coln school can handle. "So," ask the grads, "what is the use of getting into the Big Nine,' even if the Western conference mentors will have us ,and they really would have us, we have heard?"
