### CONSOLIDATION QUESTION UP

Another Attempt May Be Made to Merge City and County.

### CITY OFFICIALS FAVOR PLAN

Advocates of Annexation of South Omaha Believe Consolidation of Governments Would Hasten This End.

Rumors that another attempt will be made to consolidate the city of Omaha and Douglas county governments by the introduction and passage of a bill in the legislature this winter have been circulated by business men and politicians who maintain that economy in the administration of city and county affairs would justify this move.

"There's no doubt but what we are coming to this thing," said City Commissioner Dan Butler. "We have already consolidated two important offices—that of treasurer—and there is no complaint to be made of the results. The expense to the taxpayers would be materially reduced by one government and justice would not be thwarted."

"I have not thought anything about

this since the last attempt was made," said City Commissioner Ryder. "And so would not care to express an opinion."

Mayor Dahlgren favors consolidation. "It would be less expensive," he said. "I think consolidation will be effected some time."

Advocates of annexation of South Omaha believe the consolidation of county and city governments would hasten this end. Any measure looking toward consolidation that comes up in the legislature this winter will receive their energetic support.

### Grain Festival On in Florence, With Many in Attendance

Friday morning marked the opening of the Grain Festival at Florence which is given two days every year by the Commercial club of that bustling community. Over \$20 in prizes was the incentive to a large and varied entry list of products grown in that part of Douglas county. Especially large and interesting is the exhibit of corn. No admission fee being charged large crowds are always in attendance. The festival will close Saturday night after what is practically a horse show in the afternoon, special prizes having been put up for the best general purpose work team being driven in by farmers. As there are many fine teams in this part of the country considerable interest is being manifested in this feature.

### Omahans Remaining on Their Homesteads

Of the fifty or more Omaha people who went to Mellette county, South Dakota, as homesteaders under the government land opening last spring, only one family has returned. This was Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Cox and family.

They are here merely to spend the winter, after which they expect to go to their homestead to put in a crop. Under the new law these homesteaders are permitted to be absent from the claim as much as five months in a single year. Mr. Cox is taking advantage of this privilege to winter in Omaha. Miss Nellie McDonald, former teacher in the Omaha schools, who homesteaded in the Rosebud country, obtained a position as principal of the high school at White River and is holding her cabin besides.

### QUESTION OF LAW IS INVOLVED

Petitioners Claim They Were Not Notified of Increase, but Judge Baker Says Notification Is Not Necessary.

Property owners representing several millions of dollars worth of real property in this city have applied for an injunction enjoining the city from putting into effect an increased assessment made by the county commissioners. The petitioners assert they were not notified of any increase and that the law required that such notifications be made. Judge Ben Baker, city corporation counsel, has demurred to all petitions, claiming notification was not necessary.

### HOODLUMS TO BE DISPERSED

Mogy Bernstein Appoints Special Officers to Break Up Gangs.

### WILL HAVE FULL AUTHORITY

Activities Against Rowdiness Will Be Extended by Officers to the Suburbs and Other Parts of Douglas County.

Volunteer officers have been appointed by Juvenile Officer Mogy Bernstein to wage a campaign to break up hoodlumism in Omaha and its suburbs. More officers will be named later. Young hoodlums will be arrested and punished. If second offenses are committed the boys will be sent to jail or interview home and will not be released until their parents give bonds to guarantee their good behavior.

Officers appointed are men who volunteered their services. They will act without pay. Bernstein wants more volunteers. About thirty will be appointed.
