Paving on this street will be completed within a few days. The laying of the car track is being rapidly completed and the line is expected to be in operation within a short time.

Grain Exchange Case Heard—H. R. Henderson, special examiner for the Interstate Commerce commission, who is taking evidence in Omaha, heard testimony in the case of the Omaha Grain Exchange against the Burlington railway. The Grain Exchange asks the Burlington and Great Northern to publish a joint rate on grain from Billings and Great Falls, Mont., to Omaha.

Almaek Wants Pardon—Willis Almaek, one of the three youths convicted of the murder of Ham Pak, an Omaha Chinaman, six years ago, has filed application for parole with the state board of pardon and parole. Charles Pumphrey and Basil Mullen, the other youths convicted in the Ham Pak case, heretofore have sought parole in vain. The Chinaman was murdered and robbed of less than \$10.

Stereoscopic Slides Limited—The public library has in its collection of stereoscopic slides a number of pictures which may readily be used for Christmas programs. Most of these are famous pictures and are interesting both as objects of art and for the subject. So many re-

quests have been received for the use of these slides that the library has limited their circulation to the people of the city. Sunday schools or other organizations which may wish these for use with their Christmas programs will do well to make early application.

Two Persons Hurt, Many Shaken Up When Cars Crash

Two persons were hurt and a score of more badly shaken up at 7 o'clock last night in a rear-end street car collision at Forty-second and Hamilton streets. The injured are: Mrs. Anton Larson, fifty-third and Military avenue. The former was badly bruised about the legs and body and the latter received a dislocated shoulder and internal injuries, when she fell out of her seat and another passenger fell on top of her. Both were taken to their homes in the police ambulance.

Both cars were going west on Hamilton street, when the first car stopped at Forty-second street to discharge passengers. The other car was coming on at a good rate of speed and struck the first car with terrific force. The injured persons were all in the first car, and the crew after assisting them to a nearby grocery store jumped back on their car and left the scene of the accident. The second car was composed of Conductor A. H. Jamieson and Motorman Lige Carter.

Elsasser Invokes the Law to Aid Him in Holding Office

County Commissioner Peter E. Elsasser, democrat, who was defeated for reelection by Henry S. McDonald, republican, filed his bond for another year's service yesterday. The action was in accordance with his heretofore announced intention to invoke a state law making all commissioners' terms three years. The law has been on the statute books for years. The first commissioner, who sought to hold office for an additional year under this law was beaten in the supreme court. From that time until now, no commissioner has tried to hold office under it. Elsasser and his attorney, J. J. Sullivan, say the law is good and the commissioner, who was defeated by the supreme court lost his case on an entirely different point.

Elsasser's bond is for \$15,000. It was filed in county court, as required by statute. County Judge Bryce Crawford approved the bond as to surety and form, but, of course, did not consider the question of Elsasser's right to another year's service.

AFFAIRS AT SOUTH OMAHA

Politicians of City Making Plans to Land Offices. CITY ELECTION NEXT SPRING

Wild Steer Breaks Loose and Throws Terror Into Crowds Along Street—Waller Tries to End Life.

While the politicians are lining up for cozy places at the state and national plenary centers, some with eyes nearer home are planning for the election to be held next spring. There are a number who maintain that no election will be needed in the event of annexation, which it is generally admitted the present legislature will provide for. Others say that the present officials must serve out the full term for which they were elected. Most of the present officers, however, feel that the law calling for an election in 1913 must be obeyed and therefore a slate is being made.

Those who are to set in on the slate will, it is understood, find little difficulty in being elected in view of the fairly conservative administration which the present officials are said to have given the city. Hector, it is understood, will lead the ticket, which, it is said, will be a non-partisan one, following closely the complexion of the present administration. As yet arrangements for places on the ticket are tentative. Hector's strength will be considerably weakened, it is said, if he should undertake to tie up with either Commissioner Ryan or Commissioner Pivonka of the present administration. It is claimed by friends of Ryan and Pivonka that Hector has been won over to the defense of the two accused commissioners. In view of the treatment accorded by the two commissioners to Hector in the administration of police board affairs, it is not thought that Hector has joined with either Ryan or Pivonka.

In state affairs Peter Powers is after the superintendency of the industrial school at Millford. Henry Richmond is a candidate for his old place, chief clerk of the house of representatives, with E. E. Ridgeway as assistant. For the national plums a number of strong men have come to the front determined to have a voice in the matter of South Omaha federal appointments. Tom Hector, Jim Bulla, John Walters, Captain Parkhurst and John M. Tanner are among those who will have something to say about federal plums when the time comes. The names of Jim Bulla, John McMillan and Captain Parkhurst will appear in the list of those who will have a try at Postmaster Lew Etter's job.

Steer in Wild Chase. Breaking away from the keepers, a wild steer dashed up Twenty-fourth street yesterday evening, terrifying all pedestrians within sight. A crowd of kindergarten children at Twenty-fourth and J streets was thrown into a panic by the animal, which, fortunately, ran by without injuring them. The brute was finally roped near Twenty-fourth and I streets.

Tries to End His Life. With the rude hand of the law standing between him and his affinity, Harry Waller, alias Babe Donovan, made an unsuccessful attempt to plunge a penknife into his heart last night at his room, Twenty-seventh and L streets. Hattie Porter of 1516 Cuming street, Omaha, looked on while Harry fought desperately to show his affection for her.

According to Hattie, who was detained at the police station last night, Waller has been urging her to marry him for some time. Hattie is just a bit shy of taking the step because of the trifling inconvenience of another husband. Last night Hattie was about to return to her room in Omaha when Waller raised objections. He said he loved Hattie and wanted to marry her right away. He also accused Hattie of trifling with his young affections. A fight ensued and the police were called.

While Harry was in custody he plunged a penknife into the region above his heart. At the police station Dr. E. J. Shanahan dressed the wound and Harry was placed in the bull pen. Hattie, in the bridal suite on the second floor, complained that she was not to blame for her fatal beauty had such a disastrous effect upon Harry. She admitted that the suicidal attempt of Harry was the outcome of his ardent passion for her. She said she hoped Harry would recover, but she was still unable to agree on marriage with him because her other man was still living.

Ellick Talks on "Cost Finding" in Job Printing

How printers have existed as long on the haphazard business system they have employed was the wonder of F. I. Ellick last night when he addressed the members of the Tri-City Ben Franklin club, an organization of employing printers, at a supper given at the Paxton hotel Thursday evening, at which eighty-five were present.

Ellick discussed a plan of cost finding, showing employes how they could raise their wages by assisting employers in finding the cost of production on various jobs. By a system of checking up the time spent on each job brought into a printing plant, he said, employes could greatly assist their employers. Cost finding systems have been evolved in recent years and since they have come into existence printers have wondered how they made their businesses pay before.

Episcopalians Would Make it Difficult for Loan Sharks to Exist

Prominent Episcopalians of the diocese of Nebraska are going before the legislature this winter in the effort to secure the enactment of a law that will put the loan shark out of business. The movement has been started by Dean Tanecek and has the support of the clergy and laymen of the church. According to the plan of Dean Tanecek an association will be organized and when a poor man seeks to secure a loan he will become a shareholder. Shares will be \$10 each. When a man subscribes for one share, he will draw \$10 from the association treasury, paying the money back at the rate of 10 cents per week, or more, as he may feel able.

Shall Street Car Stops Be Changed? The Commercial Club and the Omaha Auto-Motor (automobile) Club desire to have street cars stop at the near side of the street intersections to take on and let off passengers instead of at the far side, as they do at present. The claim is made by them that it will lessen accidents. The Omaha & Council Bluffs Street Railway Company does not favor the change for the following reasons: 1. It has been the established practice in this city, ever since street cars have been operated, to stop on the far side of intersections, and it is the established practice in the majority of cities throughout the country today. We feel a change would be confusing to residents and strangers alike. 2. To stop at the near side of intersections would leave the car entrance fifty feet away from the cross-walk, compelling passengers to wade through mud when boarding cars on unpaved streets, and compelling them to wade through snow and slush when boarding cars even on paved streets on many days during the winter. 3. Careful study and investigation fails to substantiate the claim that the near-side stop lessens accidents. The theory of advocates of the near-side stop is that there will be fewer collisions if cars stop on the near side of the street intersections. Our experience and the experience of other street railways is that but few collisions occur at intersections where the car is about to stop. Ninety per cent of all collisions occur either in the middle of the block or at intersections where the car is not about to stop and, therefore, would not be affected by the change, and the remaining ten per cent would still occur, because the chance of a street car colliding with another vehicle when crossing an intersection remains the same whether it is starting up from a stop or coming to a stop as it crosses the intersection. In either event, the speed of the car would be the same. IF THE OMAHA & COUNCIL BLUFFS STREET RAILWAY COMPANY BELIEVED THAT THE NEAR-SIDE STOP WOULD LESSEN ACCIDENTS, IT WOULD BE QUICK TO ADOPT IT FOR FINANCIAL REASONS, IF FOR NO OTHER, AS IT IS COMPELLED TO PAY THE DAMAGES. 4. A number of cities, after trying the near-side stop, have abandoned it and returned to the former practice of stopping at the far side. Notable among the cities is the City of Minneapolis where conditions are very similar to the conditions in our own city. The Omaha & Council Bluffs Street Railway Company desires to do in this matter what the majority of its patrons wishes it to do, and, in order to give its patrons the opportunity to express themselves, will take a vote on the question. On Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, November 26th, 26th and 27th, passengers on paying their fare will receive from the conductor a ballot, on which they will please indicate their wishes in the matter by marking a cross opposite "FAR SIDE" or "NEAR SIDE" and drop the same in the box on the rear platform of the car. It should be borne in mind that if the near-side stop is adopted, cars will no longer stop on the far side. Men, women and children alike are entitled to a vote for each fare they pay, and we sincerely hope that all persons will exercise their right to vote each time they ride, so that we may have a fair expression of public sentiment on this question, not only for our own guidance, but also for the guidance of the City Commissioners, who have been requested by the Commercial Club to enact an ordinance requiring us to stop on the near side instead of the far side.
