### HOLT COUNTY WOMAN SUES FOR DEATH OF HER HUSBAND

Thrown out of his engine cab when the locomotive careened round a sharp curve in mountainous Vermont, Harry L. Peake a fireman on the Central Vermont railroad, struck against the rocks beside the right-of-way and was instantly killed.

So declared Mrs. Jessie Peake of Holt county, Nebraska, his widow, in a suit for \$5,000 damages for his death, filed in Douglas county district court. She is the only surviving relative.

Peake met his death on August 17, 1911. It is alleged in the petition that the mountainous country through which the road runs necessitates the fixing of chains around the engine gangways to protect the engineers and firemen from being thrown out when sharp curves are negotiated. It is charged the company failed to provide chains on this engine, the death resulting.

### FACTORY SHOWS GOING BIG

Much Interest Shown in Exposition at Kansas City.

IT IS MADE PERMANENT THING

Omaha Exposition Will Exceed in Beauty and Character All Other Shows Given in the Mid-West Territory.

Local manufacturers are greatly interested in the report just received by the "Made in Nebraska" show management of the outcome of the "Made in Kansas City" exhibition. One hundred and fifty manufacturers who had displays at the show, together with the officers of the Kansas City Commercial club, newspaper men and others, have decided to make the exposition an annual affair.

It was decided to hold it in November each year and make it a strictly home products affair, with space rate fixed at \$1.00 and \$1.50 per square foot, according to location. The next time the show is held it will be for three weeks instead of ten days. Many of the exhibitors expressed themselves in favor of a four weeks' show.

George Clendenen, industrial commissioner of the Kansas City Commercial club said that a sad thing about the recent "Made in Kansas City" show was the fact that many of the firms we most wanted to help refused to have anything to do with the show.

This is not going to be the condition of affairs in Omaha, whose exposition opens on the Auditorium, March 3. There is every reason to believe that it will exceed in beauty and character of exhibits any similar home products affair ever held in the middle west. Something like thirty-five firms have already secured space and have signed contracts.

The "Made in Lincoln" show is now in operation in that city and during its continuance a number of Lincoln firms will arrange to have a consultation with C. E. Belner, president of the Federation of Nebraska Retailers; G. W. Darner, vice president, and others relative to putting in a large exhibit of Lincoln manufacturers in the "Made in Nebraska" show in Omaha.
