POOL HALLS ARE CRIME BEDS

Proprietor is Given Rebuke for Encouraging Minors.

Mogy Bernstein, but Most of the Minor Frequenters Make Their Escape.

"Pool halls are the worst breeders of crime and in them can be found the very worst characters for boys to assoclate with. Instead of loafing in the pool halls the boys should be at home and I am going to see that they are kept there if I have to close every pool hall in

the city of Omaha."

The above rebuke was handed out to F. B. Riley, proprietor of a pool hall at 3421 Cunling street, by Judge Foster, as he fined the former \$50 and costs in police court. Riley appealed the case. Riley's pool room was raided by the police at the instance of Mogy Bernstein Sunday night. By the time the police had arrived in response to Bernstein's telephone message that minors were playing the majority had skipped out a rear entrance. Three boys were arrested, including Thor Lauritsen, 911 North Twenty-fifth avenue, who told the police

he was but 16 years of age. Bernstein appeared against Riley in police court, as did three patrolmen. Judge Foster said he had no sympathy for pool half proprietors who persisted in conducting their business for the benefit of minors. He declared he would instruct the police to arrest every proprietor of a pool room in Omaha in which boys under 18 years of age were allowed to enter. He said the city ordinance not only forbids minors playing pool, but also probibits them from even frequenting such places.
