Miss Morse Sues to Recover Shares in Steamship Company

NEW YORK, Dec. 5 .- Suit in behalf of a sister of Charles W. Morse, the former fork, New Haven & Hartford Railroad

The action was instituted by Miss Jennie Morse in the court of chancery as a stockholder of the Metropolitan Steamship company. She, as the holder of 187 shares of stock, alleges that the Metropolitan company was so illegally manipulated that it came into the control of the New York, New Haven & Hartford rallroad and thereby gave to that corporation a complete monopoly of the passen ger and freight traffic water lines between New York and Boston. Miss Morse requests the court to have the transactions annulled and the steamers Yale and Harvard, sold to a Pacific coast line, returned to the Metropolitan Steamship

The Morse bill of complaint also makes the Pacific Navigation company a codefendant. It is alleged that the Pacific Navigation company obtained the Yale and Harvard through a transaction unfalt to the stockholders of the firm which

Dr McLaughlin Asserts Every Case of Deadly Fever Caused by Somebody's Ignorance or Carelesaneas.

NEW YORK, Dec. 5-One hundred and eventy-five thousand cases of typhoid fever annually in this country could be with an annual saving of 16,200 lives, in the optnion of Dr. Allan J. McLaughlin of the United States public health service, voiced today in an address before the sixth annual convention of the Association of Lafe Insurance Presidents in New York: Dr. McLaughlin declared: That the economic loss caused by ty phoid fever in this country is \$100,000.000

EMMET DISCUSSES SUPERVISION

Understanding Among States Highly Besirable, Asserts Spenker.

Points Out Serious Duty. NEW YORK, Dec. 5 .- A tacit, understanding among the states that each will give its own life insurance companies such thorough and proper supervision as to make it unnecessary for other states to concern themselves greatly over those companies is highly desirable and would alleviate hardships now borne by some of the larger companies. So declared William T. Emmet, superintendent of insurance of New York, in an address today before the convention of the Association of Life insurance Presidents in New York. Mr. Emmet said in part:

'How shall we in the field of supervision so arrange matters that companies which do business in more than nsurance superintendent assumes an intolerant attitude toward all other laws and methods than his own, and thus invites retaliation against his home companies at the hands of other states in which these companies are doing business? The frequency with which trouble of this kind seems to threaten, even if it does not notually always ungulf us, makes me at times wish from the bottom of my heart that we could have a system of national insurance supervision in the United States. One cannot help feeling that the existing syste of supervision by states has been largely not have a system of national supervision. the United States. For the present, at it is necessary for it to be done. any rate, we must do the best we can with the old machinery.

"Under these circumstances, it seems to me that we in the different state departments stand under a very solemn obligation to try to meet the present difficulties growing out of supervision by the owners of the hotel forced the door. officials are inclined to be satisfied with states rather than by the nation, by making the largest possible concessions. whenever any trying situation arises, to the idea of reciprocity and comity between the states.

"The national convention of insurance commissioners is doing a great work in standardizing insurance legislation and methods of supervision, and in promoting a good feeling between the departments in the different states. But not even that beneficient institution can relieve the situation very much when a State department, in its dealings with companies of other states, maintains too priggish and pharisaical an attitude in all the rest of the sisterhood.
