Augustus Kountze Gives Omahans Assurance of Early Start.

WORK WILL BEGIN IN MARCH

Premont Project Will Require Expenditure of \$5,000,000, Which Will Pay for Canal, Headworks, Power House.

That construction work will begin as early as March I and be continued without delays until that portion of the Platte river power canal known as the Fremont project is completed, is the statement of the men who are behind the proposition.

The Fremont project is backed by the Kountze Brothers of New York and Omaha, Augustus Kountze of the New York bank being the fiscal agent. The project will require the expenditure of \$5,000,000, which will pay for the construction of the canal, the headworks at Fremont and the power houses and wire lines for the transmission of the electric current into Omaha. The money is provided for and \$4,000,000 of it is in the banks, ready to be drawn upon when needed

Augustus Kountze, who has been in Omaha for a week or more looking after details in connection with the canal, assured his friends before he left for the east that the canal would be started within the time limit required by the state laws, which, in this instance, Heptember 15, 1915,

Take Over Power Company. In addition to building the power canal the company in which the Kountses are interested and of which they are the chief backers, expect to take over the Omaha Electric Light and Power company and also ask the city for a franchise that will permit of furnishing light and power. The city of South Omaha will be asked to grant a similar

The Fremont project is one of three power canal projects along the Platte river. The one farthest up the stream is known as the Babcock project. It takes the water from the Loup river a short distance above Genoa, carries it onto the high prairie north of Columbus and into the Shell creek valley. It carries it to a point just above Columbus, where it is dropped back into the Platte, having a fall of ninety feet, producing 22,000 horse-

Bulow this is what is known is the Boog's project. To supply power, the water is taken out of the Platte just below Columbus, carried onto the ridge to the north and then through a canal, being dropped back into the river a short distance below Schuyler. This canal has a head of sixty-six feet and produces

The Fremont project takes the water out of the Platte just below Schuyler and carries it along the south side of the stream a distance of twenty-six miles. discharging it into a natural reservoir opposite and a short distance below Fre-

Shorter Than River. From Schuyler to Fremont, the Platte has a fall of five and one-half to six feet to a mile. While they have not been made public, it is said to be the plans of the people behind the Babcock and Boggs people to also secure franchises in Omaha and South Omaha, wire their power into the two cities and sell it to manufacturers, thus making available \$2,000 horse-power for commercial purposes.

The formal acceptances of all the powers to send delegates to the ambassadorial conference to be held in London have not yet been received, but there is no reason to suppose there will be any delay in the assembling of the conference,
