ORDINANCES PUT TO SLEEP

Skating Season is Now in Full Blast

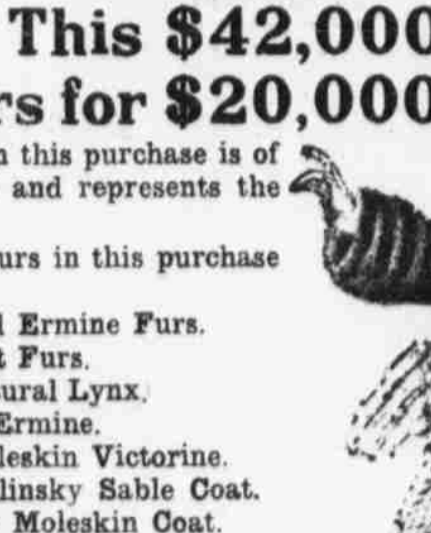
