KANSAS CITY, Dec. 12.—L. R. Marmon, a farmer living near Columbus, Neb., who was stricken blind by lightning eighteen months ago, recovered his sight in the Union station here today. Three months ago the man went to St. Louis and underwent an operation. Apparently it failed, and with his wife he left St. Louis for home yesterday. While waiting for his train to Nebraska, Marmon rested in the waiting room.

Rudolph Miller, Trusted Mail Clerk, Gets Jail Sentence

LINCOLN, Dec. 12.—Rudolph H. Miller, 24 years old, twenty-three years a trusted employe of the government in the railway mail service, pleaded guilty in federal court today to stealing letters from the mails and was sentenced to serve three months in the county jail at Hastings, Neb. Judge Mungser said the punishment was not adequate to the offense, but he took into consideration the efforts of friends in the man's behalf, his guilty plea and his long good standing. Miller was formerly a minister of the gospel and deputy grand master of Nebraska Odd Fellows.

TWO GEORGIA BANKERS ARE SENT TO CHAIN GANG

ATLANTA, Ga., Dec. 12.—J. W. Griffin, president, and R. H. McCrary, cashier of the Athens Banking and Trust company, pleaded guilty today to charges of violating the state banking laws. They were sentenced to serve five years each in the chain gang. The men were charged in ten indictments with systematically wrecking the bank of which they were officers.

Roberts Succeeds Platt.

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—D. I. Roberts was today elected president of the United States Express company, filling a vacancy that has existed ever since the death of Thomas C. Platt. Mr. Roberts is general manager of the Quebec, Montreal & Southern railroad, a subsidiary of the Delaware & Hudson, and has his headquarters at Montreal.

RULES FOR PARCELS POST

Specifications in Regard to Packing Perishable Articles Given Out.

RAILROADS MAKE OBJECTIONS

Say They Are Not Obligated to Accept Packages Weighing More Than Four Pounds Under Their Contracts.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—According to the regulations governing the parcels post system, promulgated by Postmaster General Hitchcock, perishable articles may be sent through the mails only under specific restrictions as to their containers and the distance they are to be sent. Butter, lard, fish, fresh meats, dressed fowls, vegetables, fruits, berries and similar articles likely quickly to decay may be sent for short distances when securely packed. Eggs will be accepted for local delivery when packed properly in a container, and for any distance when each egg is separately packed in a perfectly secure manner.

No restriction is placed on the mailing of salted, dried, smoked or cured meats, but fresh meat will be transported only within the first zone.

Fragile articles, including military, toys, musical instruments and articles of glass in whole or in part, must be securely packed and marked "fragile."

Liquors and Reptiles Excluded. Articles that may not be sent by parcel post include intoxicating liquors of any kind, poisons, animals, insects or reptiles, explosives of every kind, inflammable articles, including matches; infernal machines, pistols or revolvers; disease germs, any obscene, defamatory or scurrilous matter now prohibited by law; live or dead animals or birds or live poultry, raw hides or pelts, or anything having a bad odor.

Books and printed matter may not be forwarded at parcel post rates, but only at the pound rates or third class matter.

Railroads Want More Pay. A commission of railroad officials, headed by President Ralph Peters of the Long Island railroad, today petitioned the house postoffice committee for a rearrangement of weighing and pay for transporting mails. The railroad men set out that they did not contemplate carrying the parcel post when their present contracts were made, and declared as a matter of contract they were not obliged to accept packages weighing more than four pounds.

IMPLEMENT AND HARNESS DEALERS AT SIOUX FALLS

SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Dec. 12.—(Special.)—The Retail Implement Dealer's association of South Dakota, Southwestern Minnesota and Northwestern Iowa has just concluded its annual convention here after sessions extending over three days. The following officers were elected for the coming year: President, L. G. Oelshreiner, Webster; vice president, George H. Wasky, Madison; secretary-treasurer, E. C. Barton, Vermilion. Various standing committees also were elected.

The state association of harness dealers, which held its annual convention in conjunction with the implement and vehicle dealers, elected the following officers for coming year: President, G. N. Lounsbury, Centerville; vice president, A. J. Dereks, Highmore; secretary-treasurer, James Gilbertson, Vermilion.

FINE AND DAMAGE VERDICT AGAINST FARMER

MITCHELL, S. D., Dec. 12.—(Special.)—George Fuller, a retired farmer, who is quite wealthy, was twice convicted yesterday, once on his own motion when he pleaded guilty to a statutory charge and again when a jury returned a verdict against him in a \$10,000 civil damage suit. Mrs. Claude Scooby, a woman who has traveled with a street carnival company as a slack wire walker, was the complaining witness in both cases. Fuller was arrested on the statutory charge when he was found with the Scooby woman and while the jury was out on his civil case Fuller went before Judge Smith and pleaded guilty to the other charge, the court giving him a fine of \$50. Last night the jury brought in a verdict awarding Mrs. Scooby \$1,000 damages for Fuller's ill treatment of her.

WOMAN POISONS CHILD, THEN CUTS IT THROAT

OAKES, N. D., Dec. 12.—Mrs. R. A. Grieff today was adjudged insane and sent to the State hospital after she had given her 3-year-old child two grains of strychnine and then cut its throat with a razor. The child was dead when found. Mrs. Grieff is said to have admitted that she later intended to kill three other children which she had locked in another room of the house.

VALLERY NAMED RECEIVER OF COLORADO MIDLAND

DENVER, Colo., Dec. 12.—George W. Vallery, president, was appointed receiver of the Colorado Midland Railroad company today upon the application of the Central Trust company of New York, filed with the United States district court. The trust company is trustee under the Colorado Midland's first mortgage bonds. The receivership was asked for the benefit of the bondholders.

DEATH RECORD

Mrs. Margaret Emily Pethoud, BEATRICE, Neb., Dec. 12.—(Special.)—Mrs. Margaret Emily Pethoud, who located in Gage county in 1883, died yesterday afternoon at her home, six miles north of Beatrice, aged 73 years. She was born in Ohio and died on the old homestead where she had lived for more than half a century. Her husband, Frank M. Pethoud, passed away six years ago. The deceased leaves a family of seven children, all grown.

Signals of Distress Sighted. EAST TAWAS, Mich., Dec. 12.—The steamer "Pickard" is trapped under the ice and Kier's "Tawas City" today was sighted flying signals of distress and a life saving boat was successfully launched at Tawas City and set to assist them.

TURKS WILL IGNORE GREEKS UNTIL THEY SIGN THE ARMISTICE

army opened a general attack on the right wing, and in spite of the incessant fire of the Turks occupied Aetorachon. Our artillery, firing with marvelous precision, succeeded after a four-hour duel in silencing the hostile batteries at Lagatara. Our wounded numbered about 200. The battle was interrupted by the fall of night.

Turkey Ready to Resume Fight.

PARIS, Dec. 12.—"If the allies do not permit a peace which is honorable for Turkey hostilities will be resumed immediately."

This was one of the declarations made by Rehad Pasha, one of the Ottoman plenipotentiaries, in an interview today with a correspondent of Temps as he passed through Paris on his way to London.

Rehad Pasha added that the Turkish army was daily increasing in numbers. "There are now," he declared, "170,000 well armed, well fed and healthy Turkish troops at Tehatalia who are ready to resume the war if the terms offered by the Balkan states are too onerous."

The Ottoman plenipotentiary remarked also that Turkey was disposed essentially to recognize the autonomy of Albania under the suzerainty of the sultan. He declared it was difficult for the Turkish representatives to negotiate with Greece unless Greece decided to join the armistice.

MINING DIVIDEND CHECKS RETURNED AS WORTHLESS

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—Arnes H. Morris of Oxford, O., one of the alleged victims of A. L. Wisner & Co., testified for the government today at the trial of A. L. Wisner and John J. Meyers, charged with fraudulent use of mails in selling mining and oil stocks. The government claims the firm sold worthless stocks to thousands of persons and one of the exhibits is a "sucker" list of 1800 names.

Miss Morris said she had been led to buy stock in companies promoted by the defendants by glowing literature. She was further encouraged, she said, by small dividends on her stock, but finally the dividend checks were returned by banks as worthless. The government prosecutors say they have thousands of such checks.

KANSAS CITY STREET RAILWAY DEFAULTS ON INTEREST

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 12.—A demand was made on the receivers of the Metropolitan Street Railway company today to pay immediately an additional bond indebtedness of \$100,000. The debt represents bonds that the trustees assert became due because of the receivership, although they do not fall due until next May.

W. R. Begg, a New York attorney, representing the trustees for the bonds, made the formal demand. Frank Hagerman,

chief counsel for the receivers, refused, saying the bonds were not due until May 1, next year.

Mr. Begg then gave notice that he would apply to William C. Hook, judge of the United States circuit court, for permission to file a suit to foreclose on the property of the Metropolitan and offer it for sale at public auction. Judge Hook is in St. Louis. Mr. Begg will apply for permission there this week. He said he expected to file the foreclosure suit in the federal court here next week.

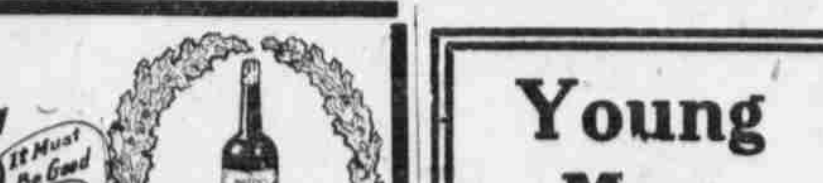
