AFFAIRS AT SOUTH OMAHA

Leaders Show Disappointment Over Tuesday Meeting. PEOPLE AGREED TO ANNEXATION. Seem Determined to Bring It About in Spite of What Machine Politicians Can Do to Perpetuate Their Offices. Because the citizens of South Omaha can no longer be fooled by noise and the beating of political tom-toms, gang leaders who engineered the so-called mass meeting Wednesday night confessed their disappointment yesterday. The more intelligent of the leaders sadly acknowledged that times are changed, and some of them even admitted that it looked as if the people were determined to be annexed to Omaha without delay.

Suffragists Say They'll Build a Club All Their Very Own

On being told by Manager Parrish of the Commercial club Publicity Bureau, that it is against the constitution and bylaws of the Commercial club to allow organizations not having at least 90 per cent of their membership in the club to use the rooms in the Woodmen of the World building, Mrs. A. C. Anderson, 1730 South Twenty-eighth street, representing the Omaha Suffrage societies, has announced that the women will build a Commercial club of their own. She had asked Parrish for the use of the Commercial club rooms for the suffragists' annual dinner, when the refusal was made. Such privilege, she was told, would also be against the club's treaty with the hotel men not to allow outsiders to give dinners there.

VALUABLE POUCH IS STOLEN

Sack Destined for Council Bluffs Taken Off Wagon. CONTAINED REGISTERED MAIL. Riffled Bag Thrown Over Fence Into Yard of Western Fuel Company Made Up at Delvein for the Bluffs. A mail sack robbery that may involve heavy losses was made public yesterday morning when the empty pouch, split open on one side and all of the contents taken out, with the exception of several newspapers in wrappers, was found in the yards of the Western Fuel company, located at Tenth avenue and South Sixth street in Council Bluffs. The pouch had been stolen from the platform of the Great Western depot at 8:15 o'clock the night before, and the theft made known to the Postoffice department. It was evident that all of the contents of the bag had been emptied into another receptacle and taken to some point where the letters and packages could be examined at leisure.

MYSTERIOUS MESSAGE LEADS TO PRECAUTIONS

Telegrams and messages thought to be in secret code sent to Diggs Nolen, alias C. J. Thomas, are worrying deputy sheriffs in charge of the county jail. They suspect that all of Nolen's pals were not rounded up in the recent raid at Memphis, Tenn., and they are guarding him closely lest he should receive aid from the outside and attempt to break jail. Yesterday a special delivery letter sent to Nolen was found to contain a telegram signed by "W. A. Boyd" of Waco, Tex., and addressed to a Savannah address. In it was a jumble of meaningless words, and this is looked upon with suspicion by deputy sheriffs, who refuse to allow Nolen to see it.

LECTURE COURSE PLANNED BY RABBI FREDERICK COHN

UNIVERSITY OF OMAHA TO DEBATE WITH TARKIO

Arrangements have just been completed whereby the University of Omaha and Tarkio college will hold two debates on either the first or second Friday night in March. The question which will be discussed will be some phase of the single tax. Each school will be represented by an affirmative and a negative team, the affirmative debating the issue at home and the negative arguing for its rejection away. These two will probably be the only forensic contests in which the university will enter this year, though Grand Island college is seeking a debate with the locals. Prof. Edward Burke, instructor in economics and international law, will direct the work of the squad.

YEISER CHANGES HIS PLANS

Get-Together Conference Will Not Be Anything of the Sort. REPUBLICANS MUST SURRENDER. Roosevelt Tells His Nebraska Admirer Where to Head In, and His Orders Are Promptly Obeyed. Colonel John O. Yeiser has revised his plans for a "get-together" conference of bull moosers and republicans at Lincoln in January. What he now proposes to do is to take the republican party of Nebraska over in a body and deliver it to the bull moose organization. This change of plans is due to the receipt of a letter from Colonel Roosevelt, in which the writer chides Colonel Yeiser for presuming to interpret his former letter as even hinting that anything but an unconditional surrender by the republicans would be considered by the bull moosers. Colonel Yeiser has written to Colonel Roosevelt, admitting the propriety of the rebuke and pledging himself to bring the republicans penitently into the colonel's camp or "bust."

Colonel Yeiser's Reply

OMAHA, Dec. 12.—Hon. Theodore Roosevelt, New York.—My Dear Sir: The conditions expressed in your letter which will consider a get-together movement is entirely satisfactory to the west. Our Nebraska meeting, January 5, will be in harmony with those conditions or it will "bust." The republican party of the nation will be compelled to accept them or it will split again. We expect to continue work previously outlined. It is for the republicans' misfortune on my quoting only a part of your letter. I used it all. Sincerely yours, JOHN O. YEISER.
