TURKISH COURIER ARRIVES

LONDON, Dec. 21 .- When the peace envoys of the Balkan states and Turkey met again in conference at St. James palace this afternon, Servia, on the suggestion of Great Britain, France and Russia, declared its readiness to accept the principle of Albanian autonomy and neutralization. The fear is entertained in many quarters that Austria-Hungary is planning a scheme, which if it proves successful, will make Servia a kind of a vassal state. It is rumored that among other conditions of a financial, commercial and economic character, Austria-Hungary Intends to impose a limitation on the strength of the Servian army which neither the Balkan league nor Russia would ever admit.

CHICAGO, Dec. 21 .- A private bank, which advertised to pay 100 per cent interest a year 'on all deposits from one cent to \$15,000,000," was closed today with the arrest of F. B. Carson, its promoter, on a charge of using the mails to defraud. According to postoffice inspectors, Carson rented a postoffice box, which he gave as the address of the Chicago bank. LINCOLN CLUB TAKES **REGISTRATION CASH** PAID OUT TO PAD LIST

Executive Committee of Teachers' Association Hands Over \$1,321 and it is Accepted.

ILLEGALLY PAID ASSOCIATION Money Turned Back by Which Lists Were Stuffed.

NEW BALLOTS OUT IN JANUARY Will Be Sent to Teachers After List is Purged.

THREE DATES FOR THE MEETING

Members of Association Will Choose Time and Meeting Place, Canvass of Votes Being Made Eighth of February.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Dec. 21.—(Special Telegram.) At the meeting of the executive commlitee of the Nebraska State Teachers' association, held here today, the retiring treasurer, J. A. Woodard of Havelock, announced that the Lincoln Commercial club had accepted \$1,321 from the associa-

The money represented 1.321 filegal registrations made by the club of teachers, who were listed as members of the State Teachers' association at its annual convention in Omaha last month.

The treasurer also turned over to the committee the same number of individual receipts which had been given the club for the registration. These receipts will be used to purge the registration list of the state association.

At a meeting held here two weeks ago the executive committee ordered that all money paid by any commercial club for the registration of teachers be returned and after a rigid investigation which developed one of the greatest attempts to pad a registration by the local commercial club, directed that \$1,321, which represented that many illegal registrations in twelve counties directly configuous to Lincoln, be returned.

Club Takes Cash Back. It was not known whether the Lincoln commercial club would accept the meney, but the report of the retiring treasurer cleared the situation. The club likewise returned the receipts, according to the reasurer, which it had been given.

The recretary was ordered to revise the list and present the corrected one in time for the referendum ballet, which will be taken next month. This ballot, which will determine the next meeting place of the association, will be sent out on January 15 and will be safeguarded so that none but bong fide teachers who are members of the association will be permitted to cast a ballot on the selection of the next
