

CLUB WOMEN SELL ALL SEALS

Large Number of Towns Are Making Strong Campaigns.

DAUGHTERS ADD CHAPTERS

Omaha Woman's Club Will Not Give Reception on New Year's Day—Other Clubs Soon Renew Their Activity.

The Mothers' Culture club will meet at the home of Mrs. W. W. Fisher, 220 F street, South Omaha, Friday afternoon, December 27. The program of the meeting will be on the subject of "Methods of Establishing Right Ideals, Precept and Example." Those who will contribute to the program are Mrs. C. J. Dutton, Mrs. J. O. Detwiler, Mrs. R. W. Koch and Mrs. W. W. Fisher.

The advanced French will meet Friday morning, December 27, in the club rooms with their leader, Mrs. Ben S. Baker.

The West Omaha Mothers' Culture club will meet at the home of Mrs. T. J. Cooper, 622 Parker street, Friday afternoon, December 27, at 2 o'clock. The subject of the afternoon will be "The Value of Myths and Fairy Tales."

The Omaha Woman's club will not give a reception on New Year's day owing to the fact that the club will not be able to get the use of the club rooms on that day. There will be an open meeting of the club Monday, January 4, at 2:30 o'clock, and this will be a business meeting.

The selling of Red Cross seals this year for tuberculosis prevention has been taken up by the club women of Nebraska at the following points: Omaha, Alliance, Decatur, Benson, Dundee, Holdrege, Greeley, Ashland, Alma, Aurora, Bridgeport, Beatrice, Chadron, Clarke, Central City, Dakota City, Dalton, Daykin, Edson, Fremont, Fairfield, Fullerton, Falls City, Kearney, Laurel, Long Pine, Memphis, Mead, Meadow Grove, Norfolk, North Platte, Ord, Peru, Palmyra, Randolph, Shelton, Springfield, Sidney, Scott's Bluff, Stromsburg, Seward, Syracuse, Tecumseh, Verdon, Valley, Waltham, Wood River and York.

Some of these clubs are sub-agents for the first time this year, and some have been working for tuberculosis prevention ever since the Red Cross seals came as an opportunity. Notably in the latter class is Mrs. W. R. Matthews of Fremont Omaha, Fremont erected a welcome arch and thereon blazons forth the Red Cross seal in brilliant electricity.

Ashland Woman's club inaugurated a street clean-up campaign as a result of selling seals. Aurora, hospital care for tubercular patients; Scott's Bluff; sanitary drinking fountain; the same of Shelton, Randolph, Beatrice and others; Central City, vacuum cleaner for school. In Omaha all energies are bent toward raising \$2,000 to finance the tuberculosis dispensary in Jacob's hill, 315 Dodge street, presided over by Miss Lillian H. Stuffs. Since its opening in July many cases have come for treatment in the afternoons. Mornings Miss Stuffs visits in the homes and with sufficient proceeds from the sale of seals. It looks as though but a short time before it may be said of Omaha that tuberculosis is under control.

Nebraska's chapters, Daughters of the American Revolution, will soon be augmented by the addition of two new chapters, which are now ready for the formal organization.

The new chapter at Lyons will be known as the Josiah Everett chapter, of which Mrs. Benjamin F. Everett is the organizing regent, and will be composed entirely of Everetts who are direct descendants of Josiah Everett, and all of whom have entered the national society through his revolutionary war service. All of the members except two are residents of Lyons, at least a part of the year, and one cousin who desired to be a part of this unique organization sent her application from far-away Rangoon, India.

The other chapter has been formed in Fairmont, with Miss Elizabeth Wright as organizing regent. Miss Wright, who is a new daughter, having been admitted to the national society at the December board meeting, has accomplished wonder in a short time, and will present her chapter within a couple of weeks, having already the membership list filled. During the two years' state regency of Mrs. Charles Oliver Norton, with the two chapters mentioned above, there have been eight chapters formed, bringing the number of chapters now in the state up to twenty-one, a splendid and most remarkable record.

In the death of Mrs. La Verne W. Noyes of Chicago, which occurred recently, the Daughters of the American Revolution and the United States Daughters of 1812, have sustained a great loss. Mrs. Noyes was vice president general of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution for Illinois and had a large and active interest in the work of both of these organizations. Her energy and enthusiasm were unbounded and she stood high in the councils of both societies. Mrs. Noyes was known as a patron of the fine arts and was herself an artist and a writer of talent. The Chicago chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, of which Mrs. Noyes was a member, held memorial services for her on December 19 in the assembly hall of the Fine Arts building.

Separate Lobby at the Postoffice for Parcels Post

The Omaha postoffice is to have a spacious lobby joining the stamp room on the north to be used by persons sending parcels post packages after January 1. Superintendent of Construction Cramer is working on the plans now. Superintendent Cramer, Custodian Taylor and Postmaster Wharton have had several conferences on the matter and have decided on tentative plans for such a lobby. There is at present a large lobby for the money order department, and another for the registry department. The idea is to segregate in a measure the people who visit these places to transact such business. As the sending of parcels through the mail under the parcels post is expected to be a large branch of the activity at the postoffice it was decided the persons doing such business should also be segregated by a lobby. The authorities feel that it would be unsatisfactory for persons to handle the parcels, get them weighed, and buy the stamps to stamp them all in the general lobby of the postoffice when there is a crowd on account of the confusion. There will likely be a window from the lobby where scales will be kept and a man to do the weighing at the request of patrons. There will be doors through which the parcels can be readily wheeled to the mailing room in carts after they have been dropped into the slots.
