

SOLDIERS' MONUMENT ERECTED AT CLARINDA

CLARINDA. Ia., Dec. 21.-(Special.)-The old soldiers' monument was put in place in the court house yard this week and May 31 has been selected as the dedication date. The monument is of white marble and represents a soldier, life-size, standing on a high base. The monument is thirty feet high and cost \$5,000. An interesting story attaches to the raising of this money. Twenty-nine years ago Carinda business men donated \$300 to start a fund for the purchase of a monument as a tribute to the soldier dead of Sarinda and vicinity. The money was put in the bank and forgotten and drew empound interest for twenty-nine years before it was discovered last spring. The sum had accrued \$1,190 interest. Business men subscribed \$3,500 more, and the order was given for the handsome monument which has just been placed.
