What Women Are Doing in the World

I AM in favor of woman's suffrage, for it is only justice," said Mrs. W. C. Sunderland, who has recently been made chairman of the Second congressional district of Nebraska for the campaign for suffrage in the state which has been begun. "Laws should be made to protect the working woman and the woman should have the right to do this. I can see no reason why we should not have woman's suffrage and there are many reasons why we should have it and it is only justice," said Mrs. Sunderland.

Mrs. Sunderland is a prominent Omaha woman not only in social circles, but her advice on a business proposition is welcomed by any business man as well as a woman who may have the good fortune to be given it. In choosing Mrs. Sunderland for chairman of the Second congressional district the choice was a most judicious one, for she is a woman of affairs and no matter how great the task which might be before her it would not be too large for her to manage with excellent judgment in a most conservative way. Mrs. Sunderland will devote much of her time in the future to woman's suffrage until the women of Nebraska are given the privilege of the ballot.

State headquarters have been established in Omaha by the Nebraska Suffrage association preliminary to the campaign to secure an equal franchise act at the coming session of the legislature. The offices are at 321 Brandeis building and

are in charge of Mrs. Frank Harrison of Lincoln, who has been made executive secretary of the association. The headquarters will be open for business Monday morning.

The women are now busy organizing suffrage associations in every county in the state. Mrs. Z. T. Lindsey, chairman of the Douglas county organization, has aroused the enthusiasm of the women in Benson, Florence, South Omaha, Valley, Irvington, Dundee and other communities and all are busily engaged spreading the gospel of equal franchise.

As soon as the counties of the state are well organized the suffragists will form congressional district bodies toward the end of making the women of Nebraska a unit for enfranchisement. A meeting will be held in Lincoln next week to organize the women of the First congressional district.

The West Side Woman's Christian Temperance union will hold an open meeting at the home of Mrs. C. J. Roberts, 1920 South Fifty-third street, Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Mrs. Jessie A. Meek of Los Angeles, Cal., who was one of the prominent workers in the woman suffrage campaign in California, will give an address during the afternoon. All members of the different Woman's Christian Temperance unions of the city are cordially invited.
