A big increase was expected in the visible supply of wheat during the last week, but instead of an increase there was a decrease of \$4,000 bushels, which makes the visible now \$1,31,000 bushels. As the figures were posted from time to time showing the changes in the various visible supply points it was anti-pated that a decrease was among the probabilities. There was good buying by shorts and there was also some investment demand, which caused a partial change in sentiment.

Many reports have been given out lately relative to the lack of moisture in some sections of the winter wheat belt. The first real complaints for moisture were received in the Chicago market yesterday. Many sections of the grain belt reported wheat in need of rain or snow, but in the sections of north Texas and Oklahoma, where the rain has been badly needed, the precipitation was heavy over Sunday. unday.
