GRIZZLIES ARE WALLOPED

Rourke's Take Mountaineers Into Camp by Five to Three Score.

COFFEY STARTS ARGUMENT

Disagrees with the Umpire, as Does Several of His Cohorts, Much to the Pleasure of Large Sunday Crowd.

Midst much argument on the part of the Denver base ball team and Umpire Gaston and Stockdale, Omaha copped the long end of a 5 to 3 score Sunday afternoon before a large and vociferous delegation of fans who clamored emphatically for the ump to leave Coffey, French, Faye and a few other of the Denverites from the pasture. As the ump did nothing of the kind the bugs were forced to be content with the victory. Denver had Omaha going 3 to 2, when the big noise broke. Ward and Krug were safe on a hit and an error by White respectively. Johnny Clancy came to bat with the aforementioned condition existing, except that two were out. Johnny floated the ball toward short stop. Coffey made the stop, ran a few short steps and threw to Fisher at first. During this process Ward and Krug galloped home. When the ump declared that Clancy had been hit out of the box, Clancy realized that Omaha was ahead one run. But Coffey disagreed both with the ump and the bugs.

Ump as Target. So did Mr. French. So did Mr. Fisher. And so did several other Denver athletes. For several minutes the arguments in the neighborhood of Umpie Gaston was prolonged and excited. Coffey was very peeved and he made no bones of it. By this time Stockdale, basing the works from behind the bat, became exasperated and he called two balls on Shestak. This stopped Coffey for a few minutes, but he gained courage again and kept up a flow of brilliant and unexpurgated repartee with the ump during the remainder of the combat, much to the delight of the paid customers who chortled frequently and with supreme mirth.

Omaha was fortunate in the opening inning that Denver didn't score a flock of runs. As it was the mountain climbers did score one. Faye and Cassidy delivered a couple of sailing singles and Block walked a very serious condition for a new pitcher to be in. Shestak proceeded to allow one of Tippi's cross-fire balls to trickle through him. Faye rubbed toward the plate, but started back to third. Shestak threw to Ward, but the throw was kindly hit into out. A miffy double play, Schick to Clancy to Clancy, and Mitchell whiffed, ending the doings.

Omaha scores. Omaha got nothing in its half of the first, just as Denver was schickled attended. Chase promptly hit into a double play, but Thompson hit safely. Both Denver and Omaha scored two in the third. Cassidy walked for the visitors and Block doubled. Cassidy came home when Congalton's throw hit the second base sack and Block continued to third. Mitchell doubled and Block scored, but Coffey ended the inning by rolling to Sals.

Ward Makes Another Hit. Thompson was out for Omaha, but Ward made a second home. He went to second on Congalton's infield out, to third on White's miff. After Fisher made a pretty stop of Krug's drive, and scored on Clancy's infield hit in the manner recalled above, Krug also scored, as he had previously stolen second, and the Denver athletes believed they had retired the side.

After the third, Denver stopped abruptly. Omaha had Shestak out in the sixth for luck. With Shestak out, Tippi pitched the seventh. The presumption is it was accidental, as he faithfully fanned the two previous times and did nothing on his next trip up. On Sals' infield out Tippi went to third and scored when Fisher bobbed Chase's roller.
