Bulls in Wheat Steadily Gaining More Ground.

INSPECTORS REPORT LOSSES

Representatives of Vacious Chicago Concerns All Report that Insects Have Damaged Wheat in the South.

OMAHA. May 18, 1914.

The buils in wheat are stendily saining ground in that market. The position of the bears, as well as the chorts at the close of exchange on Saturday was anything but favorable, innofar as securing a profit for them. Shorts continued to cover their outstanding obligations and there was an excellent demand from investors as well. Reports of damase hybrasian fly continue to pour in upon the trade, and they were even of a more persistent character than those of several previous days. The southwestern grain growers seem to be slow in giving the exact condition of the winter wheat plant, as the advices received at Chicago and elsewhere were quite conflicting in character nad therefore misleading.

The best crop experts in the southwest in the interests of Chicago commission houses have as one man reported losses from the insects, which now are found in such large numbers in the winter wheat belt. The fact that fly was reported on Saturday in both kansas and Nebraska makes the invasion of this insect in four states, which includes the two mentions above, as well as Missouri and Illinois.

The insect reports which have been received on the Chicago Board of Trade have caused a general re-awakening and shaking up of the speculative wheat market, where there was a lack of trade and where prices were weak there is now to be seen activity and strength.
