EUROPEAN travelers have brought home many attractive ideas, but one of the most unusual and quite artistic is the lawn decoration.

On the grounds surrounding the beautiful Storz residence on West Farnam may be seen graceful fawns, and further back on the lawn are mountain dwarfs, or gnomes, who are fabled to inhabit the inner parts of the earth, but have come forth to guard and take care of the flowers and grass and plants.

These eleven and young deer which seem so realistic come from the old German cities, Stuttgart and Wurtemberg, and are made of clay by famous artisans in these cities, also famous for toys and mechanical contrivances.

The spacious lawn of C. N. Dietz, another Omaha traveler, also has the gnomes, and in Mr. Dietz' private park adjoining his home are imported novelties from Germany, including rabbits, hens with broods of small chickens, all in clay, but so natural and artistically made that it is difficult to tell that they are not real.

The Adolphus Busch Sunken Gardens in California, which rival the kaiser's country place at Potsdam, near Berlin, has probably the largest collection of these gnomes, deers and other articles from Stuttgart. In one part of the garden is a complete village of gnomes, which is most attractive.

In the kaiser's gardens he has a large collection of deer of this famous clay, and on the lawns of the palatial residences of all of the larger residence cities of Germany, as Frankfurt, Dresden, Berlin, Wiesbaden, where the kaiser has one of his palaces, one will find these Lilliputian images adorning the wonderful lawns.
