Stock Shippers Look for Decision on Liability Clause.

EXPECTED FROM COMMISSION

Makes Vital Difference in Contracts with Railroads for Shipment of Cattle—Death Comes to Beverly Haight.

Intense interest is shown by stock shippers here and through the state in the expected decision of the Interstate Commerce commission on the limited liability clause in the railroad stock shipping contracts.

Death Comes to Haight. In the Allman show dining car at Twenty-eighth and L streets yesterday evening Beverly Haight, 30 years old and a cook attached to the show, died of a complication of diseases.

Several physicians in South Omaha attended him, but without any improvement. Haight died in the dining car, where he has officiated for a number of years as superintendent of the dining cars for the Allman Brothers shows.

Haight was born in Fishkill, N. Y., and is survived by his wife. The body was removed to Larkin's undertaking rooms, from which it will be shipped this morning to Fishkill, N. Y., for burial.

Music

Recital by Miss Pearce. Last evening Mr. Max Andrew presented Miss Helen Pearce in piano recital at the First Baptist church.

Miss Pearce is very young to make her debut in recital and surprised her many friends by her brilliant and mature manner of playing.

Miss Pearce has forceful technique, a clear singing tone and her playing is effective through a most careful regard for the dynamics, and clean-cut, artistic phrasing. She has the qualities that make for success, a great deal of assurance, talent, and interpretative ability.

The program opened with a group of classics from the old masters, a most unusual group, none of which are familiar through long use on Omaha concert programs. These were "Polonaise," by W. F. Bach, "Pavane" in G minor, by Handel; "Pastorale Variet," by Mozart, and "Ecclesiastes" (arranged by D'Albert) by Beethoven.

Of these the Bach number is especially charming, with many little purling runs and frequent cadences customary in the older style music. The Mozart number contains a lovely melody, and the "Ecclesiastes" by Beethoven, were full of joyous brilliancy.

The "Sonata in G minor," by Schumann, was really the gem of the evening. It is full of interest from the sparkling Presto, through the melodious andantino, the scherzo, with its element of humor, and the brilliant finale, all of which Miss Pearce interpreted vividly.

The "Erotico," by Jensen, was another group of unusual numbers, but also as attractive as unusual. Of these "The Enchantress" was especially graceful, full of unexpected rests and short interrupted phrases.

A group of modern numbers followed, "Etude," by Cyril Scott; "Nocturne," by Debussy; "Pavane," by Ravel; "Tintements de Clochettes," by Pugno, and the more familiar "Danse Negre," by Cyril Scott.

All of these by their weird harmonies and impressionistic effects clearly show the tendencies of the ultra modern school. The closing number was Moszkowski's "Caprice Espagnol," a most effective and brilliant number, working up to a gorgeous climax at the close.

For encores she played Chopin's "Nocturne, in E flat," repeated the Cyril Scott "Danse Negre" and played a "Sgambati Minuet." The audience taxed the capacity of the church, and was enthusiastic in its appreciation.

Miss Pearce recited large bouquets of flowers after each number. Her future in a musical way will be watched with interest. H. M. R.
