NEBRASKA WINS DUAL MEET

Romp Away with Wesleyan by Score of Eighty-Two to Thirty-Five.

TWO STATE RECORDS BROKEN

Capt. Meyers, the Cornhusker Star, Sets Two New Marks, One in High Jump and One in Shot Put.

LINCOLN, Neb., May 23.—(Special Telegram.)—Nebraska romped away with the dual meet with Wesleyan university here this afternoon, 82 to 35. Two Nebraska records were broken, Capt. Meyers, the Cornhusker star, setting new marks in the high jump and the shot put. In the high jump he cleared the bar at 5 feet 10 1/2 inches. In the shot put he broke his own record with a mark of 39 feet 4 inches. The old record in the high jump was 5 feet 9 inches and the old record in the shot put was 38 feet 10 1/2 inches. Nebraska literally swamped Wesleyan in the dashes, but in the mile O'Hara gave Wesleyan a hard fight. The 200-yard dash, which Fetz of Wesleyan won, was a pretty race, with Reese pushing the Wesleyan man all of the distance. Score: Nebraska, 82; Wesleyan, 35.
