### COUNCIL BACKS UP MAYOR

Accepts Dahlman's Recommendations in Detective Squabble.

### WOLFE'S EFFORTS ARE TABLED

Withwell Prepares New Specifications to Be Used in Case the City Decides to Repair Old City Hall Boilers.

City commissioners are backing up Mayor James C. Dahlman in his fight to expose the plot alleged to have been concocted by the Daily News against city and county officials by tricking them into accepting bribes, through Burns detectives.

At a meeting of the council in committee of the whole the mayor's recommendations in the matter were accepted and his statement placed on file "to be brought up later."

The mayor's recommendations are in reference to the installation of a new boiler plant at the city hall or the securing of heat from The Bee Building company's plant. The boiler inspector's specifications have been tabled.

Commissioner C. H. Whitnell has prepared new specifications for use in case the city decides to spend \$16,000 to repair the old boilers. These specifications will be submitted to the council Tuesday.
