DO NOT FEAR HESSIAN FLY

Pest is Fully Grown and Has Done His Worst.

CROPS REPORTED EXCELLENT

Conditions All Over the State Are Still Splendid, According to the Reports of the Burlington Agents.

The Burlington's Nebraska crop report for the week ending last Saturday, deals with the Hessian fly and mites, the damage done by the insect. The data, with reference to the damage done by the fly, it is asserted, is given out after an exhaustive investigation has been made. Relative to the winter wheat crop, General Superintendent Allen maintains that on the whole there has been no falling off in the general condition, which, on the various divisions, he places as follows, the estimate being on a percentage basis and compared with former years: Omaha division, 100 per cent. Lincoln division, 100 per cent. Wymore division, 100 per cent. McCook division, 50 per cent. As to the Hessian fly and the damage that it has wrought in the Nebraska wheat fields, the Burlington report says: "The pest made its appearance during the week in the central and eastern parts of Richardson and Nemaha counties. The University Agricultural department has investigated and reports that over this small area, as compared with the entire average of the state, fields have been damaged from very little to 30 per cent, and a few fields in the vicinity of Auburn in Nemaha county have probably been damaged 50 per cent.

Fly Full Grown. "It is stated by Prof. Swenck, who conducted the investigation and made the report, that the fly is now full grown. This means that practically no more damage will be done and that the area of further damage will not be extended. The professor estimates that the yield of wheat in these two counties will not fall below the average, due largely to an increased acreage. With fair weather from now on, most of the damaged fields will make a full crop, but under favorable weather conditions, would result in almost a total failure. With these facts in view, some farmers are plowing their wheat fields within the damaged area and planting corn."

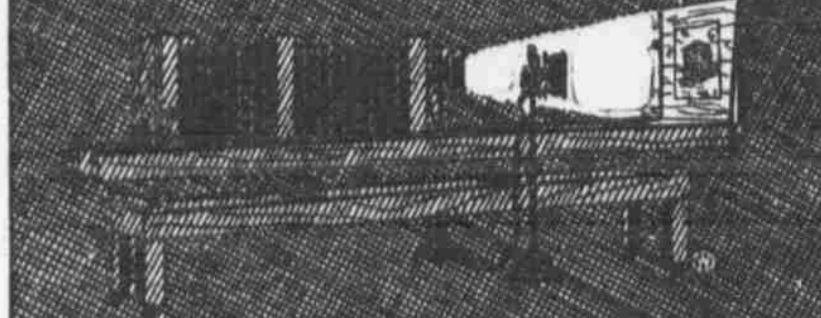
