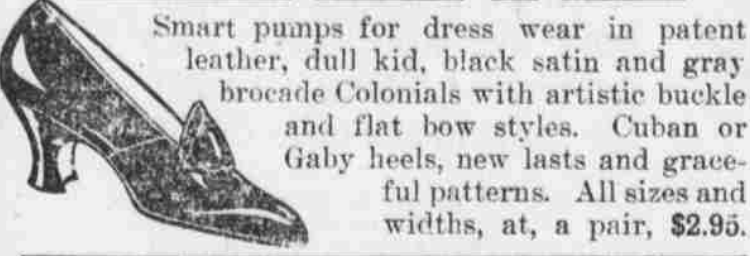

ACCIDENTALLY KILLS GIRL

Reginald A. Barr Chokes Sweetheart to Death in Playful Struggle.

THROWS SELF BEFORE TRAIN

Fourth Attempt to Commit Suicide is Successful—Takes Poison Twice and Jumps Into Pool in Stone Quarry.

LISLE, Ill., May 26.—Reginald A. Barr, leaving behind him a note declaring that his slaying of his sweetheart, Florence Bentley, at Downers Grove, three miles from here, last Saturday, was accidental, jumped in front of a moving train here early today and was killed.

It was his fourth attempt at suicide. In a note found on his person he declared he took drugs twice in an effort to die beside the body of his sweetheart, but both times failed.

He next jumped into a quarry pit, but he lit in the stagnant water and "I couldn't sink," said the note. The clothing on his body was wet when taken from the tracks.

The note said Miss Bentley was killed when he tried to kiss her. She screamed and he placed his hand on her throat. "She became quiet all of a sudden," said the note.

In remorse and fear he sat beside her for some time seeking to find a spark of life remaining in her. Finally he gave up hope and went to Aurora, where he purchased an anesthetic. He returned and, prostrating himself beside the girl's body, swallowed it.

After a while he woke up. The girl still lay very quiet beside him. Again he made the trip to Aurora, says the note, and again returned with poison to die beside the girl he had slain. This attempt also was a failure. Then he wandered for hours through the woods, before jumping in front of the train.

Throws Self in Front of Train.

JACOB AUGUST RIIS IS DEAD

Author and Social Worker Dies After Long Illness.

SPENDS LIFE SLUM FIGHTING

Many Important Reforms in Tenement Districts in New York Are Due to His Efforts—Writes Several Books.

BARRE, Mass., May 26.—Jacob A. Riis, author and social worker, died at his summer home here today after a long illness.

Mrs. Riis and a son were at Mr. Riis' bedside when he died.

Mr. Riis was brought here about two weeks ago from a sanitarium at Battle Creek, Mich., where he had been a patient for several months, taking treatment for heart trouble of long standing.

Jacob August Riis became, through his work in behalf of the poorer people in New York, "the most useful citizen" of the metropolis, according to a tribute once paid to him by Theodore Roosevelt, his intimate friend.

Riis was the thirteenth child of a Latin teacher in Ribe, Jutland, Denmark. He was born in 1849. Protesting at the literary career which his father had out for him, young Riis decided to work with his hands and became a carpenter's apprentice. The vocation he had chosen did not prevent him, however, from falling in love with Elizabeth Nielson, daughter of one of the richest men in his native town. But she refused him, and when Riis was 21 years old, having learned his trade, he embarked for New York with only \$40 in his pocket.

Riis led a varied career during the following six years. He built miners' huts in a Pennsylvania construction camp, mined coal, made bricks, drove a team and peddled flat irons and books. At 27, he accepted a beginner's place as a reporter for a New York news bureau. At the very first he made his most conspicuous success in the study of conditions of the East Side of New York.

Writes Newspaper with Notes.
With only \$75 capital and notes for \$675, he succeeded in buying the "South Brooklyn News," which was on the verge of bankruptcy, and made such a success with the property that he was able to sell it at a considerable profit a few years later. He returned to Denmark and married the girl who had refused him when he was a carpenter's apprentice. This first wife died in 1905, and two years later Riis married Mary Phillip of St. Louis.

As a reporter on the New York Tribune and later on the New York Sun, Riis took up his real work in slum fighting. While attending to routine duty as a police reporter, he worked day and night to arouse the popular need of improved living conditions. One of the first of his campaigns was against the impurity of the city water, and it was his fight which finally led to the purchase of the Croton watershed to assure safe drinking water for New York.

Meets Theodore Roosevelt.
Theodore Roosevelt was police commissioner of New York when Riis attacked the evils of police lodging houses. He won his point and incidentally, a strong ally in Mr. Roosevelt.

Zapata Junta Asks Recognition

WASHINGTON, May 26.—An agent of General Emiliano Zapata and the junta in charge of the revolutionary movement in central and southern Mexico is here and at the suggestion of Secretary Bryan has laid before President Wilson and the state department information intended to controvert ideas that Zapata is merely a bandit and that his followers are a horde of freebooters.

The agent submitted to Br. Bryan a statement of the ideals, program and plans of campaign of Zapata and his followers, the strength of his forces and the extent of territory over which he claims control and asked that in any settlement of the Mexican problem full consideration be given to the Zapataist as a leading element in the Mexican revolution.

The Zapataists base their pretensions on an assertion that they represent the revolutionary movement in the most thickly settled portion of Mexico, containing 75 per cent of all the population. Zapata, the agent informed Secretary Bryan, has an army of about 21,000. The emissary assured Mr. Bryan that Zapata and his followers would observe all the rules of civilized warfare.

Discussing the relations of Zapata to Carranza, the agent, in the memoranda presented said that the two elements, while not united, have the same ends and purposes and were working in concert.
