GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Longs Show Remarkable Strength in Holding Up Prices.

CORN ALSO RATHER STAUNCH

In Pace of Bearish Conditions Yellow Cereal Holds Up Well-World's Shipments Are

Somewhat Smaller.

OMAHA. May 25, 1914.

The May whoat futures swung between stiles and Sic yesterday, which was narrow, when the open interest in that month is considered. The longs were not inclined to permit a runaway market, as they furnished the buyers with the grain as they bid for it. May wheat was more or less congested and with only four more fusiness days in which to even up their position, shorts are likely to make an attempt to get out via the pit or private settlement before the close Friday.

There is no corner intended by the large holders of the May wheat as corners are a thing of the past in the Chicago market, being knocked out by J. C. F. Merrill soversi years ago.

The cash wheat situation, while quiet, may be called strong, Advices were received here yesterday from interior sec-

ceived here yesterday from interior sec-tions of the southwest saying millers are scouring the country for supplies and that the old wheat will doubtless sell much lower. The transactions here yesterday on milling account amounted to only 15,000 bushels. The deliveries on May con-

on milling account amounted to only 15,000 hushels. The deliveries on May contracts amounted to 20,000 bushels, showing that the wheat which was bought at Kansas City and brought here by the elevator concerns is being used to even up the position of some of those who sold themselves into a hole.

C. B. Jenkins, one of the leading millers of Indiana and located at Noblesville, in a message to Paddleford, said the wheat plant not only in that section of the state, but elsewhere, according to his advices, is deteriorating. Mr. Jenkins is one of the best posted men on crops in the "Hoosler" state, and he can see nothing but higher prices for the cash article, as the bins of the farmers have been pretty well cleaned out.

The government June report will make its appearance on the 8th day of next month, and, according to advices received by B. Frank Howard, from the Agricultural department at Washington, a par of 19.5 is to be used in figuring it. If the decline in condition should reach 30 per cent, the approximate yield would be 61,700,000 bushels.


AGED WOMAN TRIES TO DROWN HERSELF IN RIVER
