Jesus Christ. "The religion of humanity and the omprehension of humanity are of the same breed and kind and they go together. It is very proper, therefore, that under Christian auspices a great adventure of the mind, a great enterprise of the spirit, should be entered upon."

Allegiance of Mind. President Wilson emphasized the fact that the mind owes allegiance to nobody

but God, and suggested that the opening of another university was but the addition of one more means of emancipating the human mind from fear and misun-

derstanding. In conclusion he said: "So we are here setting up on this hill as upon a high prdestal once more the compass of human life with its great needle pointing steadily at the lode star of the human spirit. Let every man who wishes to know come and look upon this compass and thereafter determine which way he will go."

Secretary Daniels described the navy as a great university and emphasized the fact that patriotism and religion have always gone hand in hand. He insisted that religion and work should be united.
