SIoux CITY, Ia., May 29.—(Special Telegram.)—Sharp batting rallies in the seventh and eighth innings pulled the Indians out of apparently hopeless defeat and returned them winners over Omaha 7 to 6. It was the most nervous game played here this year and before the final out everybody, players, fans and umpire, were biting their nails, and pulling their hair.

Omaha started in with a vengeance. The first round they fell to Luhrsen for three hits and two walks, netting three runs. Schipke singled and went to second on a wild pitch. Clancy walked.
