The winter wheat crop is so far advanced at the moment that a decline in June is not looked for. In three out of the last five years there have been heavy losses, however, to the spring wheat 2rop promise. The possibility of hot winds before the winter wheat is harvested, or black rust before the spring wheat is ready to be out, would place a complete change over the entire wheat situation. The foregoing is meationed only as possibilities, and the possibilities surrounding the wheat market at present are many.
