Authorities on Exportation Declare that More Grain Has Been Contracted for Foreigners Than Expected. OMAHA, June 1, 1914.

The public is likely to be seen in the wheat market in the near future. Bulls continue to control. While the crop prospects in the winter wheat belt never any better than at present, the export market is said to promise well.

The winter wheat crop is far advanced at the moment that a decline in June is not looked for. In three out of the last five years there have been bumper crops, however, to the spring wheat crop.

One thing in favor of grain exports is the goodly amount of wheat available and the cheap rates. It is expected by the more conservative millers in the country that they will be obliged to import wheat from the spring wheat country.

Conditions surrounding the provisions market are unfavorable. It looks to the careful observer as if the market is likely to change in conditions before the market can be placed on a healthy basis.
