Secretary Daniels wished it to be announced that Mr. Little had resigned to enter business, but an examination of Navy department records shows that the paymaster's resignation was officially accepted "for the good of the service."

This time the scandal could not be suppressed. Five enlisted men left the May-One after the other reported Little. Secretary Danie's was horrified. He sent for several of the ranking officers in the navy and sought their advice.

Because of the serial prominence of the two men and because the president's yacht had been used for the escapade. the secretary understood that a scandal involving them would be extremely disinsteful to the president, as well as to prominent Washington people. The president, having been informed, it is said, told his secretary that it was most destrable for many reasons to keep the affair quiet, but that discipline must be maintained, even if in maintaining it the scandal became public. 
