ESCAPES FROM MOVING TRAIN

Demented Finlander Escapes Guards by Crawling Through Window.

TO EAST FOR DEPORTATION

Unfortunate Man Was Being Taken Back to Savannah Enroute to Native Country When He Gets Away in Iowa.

Escaping through the berth and window of a stateroom on an eastbound Northwestern train, which was cautiously progressing through the driving rain between Council Bluffs and Missouri Valley Friday night, Bernhard Turas, a Finlander, who was deported because he was demented, escaped from Immigration Inspector Charles Kurz and Guard P. T. Atkins.

Though the train was stopped at Missouri Valley and the guards of the demented alien went back over the track in search of the man, they were unable to locate their man.

Turas, a powerful fellow, in spite of the fact that he is but five and a half feet tall, was apprehended by federal authorities at Portland several weeks ago. He is only 22 years of age and after being given a hearing, was ordered deported.

The search started Friday night and the police officials of two cities, as well as authorities in surrounding towns, have been notified to keep a lookout for the man.

At Missouri Valley the immigration inspector and the guard examined the berth and found their prisoner has disappeared.

TAX INJUNCTION GRANTED

Business Firms Succeed in Stopping Collection of Personal Levy.

CONCESSION ON THE LEGALITY

Judge Sears Grants Request of the Plaintiffs on Ground that Equalization Board Was Not in Legal Power.

An injunction preventing the collection of personal property taxes of eleven Omaha business firms, based on an assessed valuation of \$206,000, was granted by District Judge Sears after the case had been twice fought out in court.

The injunction was asked by Attorney R. W. Switzer on the ground that the proceedings of the County Board of Equalization on July 1, 1914, were void on account of the fact that the session of the board had legally expired the day before. The court, by its decision, holds that the provision of the statute requiring the County Board of Equalization to hold a session of not less than three and not more than twenty days means that Sundays are to be included in the computation of time. It was alleged that the

board began its session June 10 and should have adjourned on June 20.

When the matter was fought out before Judge Troup several months ago, all of the eleven suits were joined into one. Judge Troup decided against the county on the merits of its contention, but ordered that separate suits be filed for each of the plaintiffs. After this was done the county filed a demurrer in each case, which demurrer was overruled by Judge Sears.

It is understood the county will appeal.
