Arriving in America he did not have the necessary money for admittance, but having a ticket straight through to Omaha, he was allowed to enter the country. His first occupation was that of dis-

patch boy for the Associated Press in the evenings. In the meantime he had entered Kellom school in the second grade and diligently applied himself to the study of the English language. He received many a helping hand for his patience and his capacity for learning playing compositions by Wagner, List soon won the attention of his teachers and in a short time, four and a half years, at the age of a little over fifteen. he had graduated.

He came out for the high school team this spring, but lack of experience kept him from landing a place, While in the Kellom school he was on the track team for several years.


