July Wheat is Considered in Strong Position.

CORN LOOMS UP IN STRENGTH Yellaw Cereal Has Good Hold on the

The wheat markets of the world are in an abnormal position, brought about by the excellent demand for the old crop and the feeling on the buying side that the new crop is unlikey to move to points of distribution as early as has been generally reckened. The surplus wheat in the southwest has been pretty well cleared up and because of this the new wheat will go late the hands of millers.

July wheat is in a strong position, it is largely short in this market as the old bear drowd has put out heavy commitments in the teller that they would be able to deliver, or that the price of that month would sell of, and give them a chance to cover at handsome profits. Cash wheat strength has been a disappointment to more than one of the snort sellers, and the likelihood is that those who remain out until the month of July rolls around will experience some trouble in getting under cover.
