FUNERAL OF REV. THOMAS M'CAIGUE HELD TUESDAY

Many friends of Rev. Thomas McCaigue, who died Sunday, attended the funeral services at the Central United Presbyterian church this afternoon. Many mourners who were unable to attend the service went to the church between 1 and 3 o'clock, while the body lay in state, and viewed the features of the veteran minister and missionary for the last time.

Ever since 1867 the deceased had lived in Omaha. He had reared a large family of sons and daughters, who are now well known and highly respected here. The four sons, John L. Will L., Thomas H. and Brower E. McCaigue, a son-in-law, Rev. Albert Gordon of Lincoln and a grandson, John L. McCaigue, Jr., were the active pallbearers.

Rev. Hugh B. Speer, pastor of the church, assisted by Rev. A. C. Douglas of the First United church, conducted the services at the church and grave. Honorary pallbearers were the elders of the church—William Baird, George G. Wallace, G. S. Benawa, George F. Gilmore, Dr. H. P. Hamilton, George W. Welch, A. W. Bowman and J. E. Dodds. Burial was in Prospect Hill cemetery.
