### CADETS WATCH TOWN BURN

High School Lads See Loveland Business Center Ablaze.

### CAMP IS NOW DOWN TO ROUTINE

Heavy Rain Gives the Cadets a Good Wetting, but the Morning Sun Fast Dries Up the Camp.

NINETEEN FOURTEEN CAMP, Missouri Valley, June 9.—(Special.)—The cadet camp was in a state of great excitement last night because of a fire in the town of Loveland, about four and one-half miles south of here. The fire could be plainly seen from camp and from downtown. A call for help was sent to Missouri Valley and numerous automobile parties were organized and left immediately to render what assistance was possible. The town of Loveland consists of about 300 inhabitants and the fire consumed the feed store, the grain elevator, the dance hall and a private residence.

There was a hard rain last night which

started about 10:30 p. m. and lasted for four or five hours. The tents and the grounds are soft from the rain, but the sky is now clear and the sun is shining brightly and the ground will soon be as dry as before the rain.
