BODY IS FOUND IN THE GARAGE

Tens and Awning Manufacturer Had Been Dead Some Time When a Doctor Was Summoned to Give Medical Ald.

'Albert H. Rawitzer, 1004 South Thirtyseventh atreet, president of the Scott-Rawitzer Manufacturing company, prominent Omaha business man, caused his own death at 8:30 o'clock yesterday

morning by taking carbolic acid. The body was wound in the garage adjacent to a corrage just built by Mr. Rawitzer at Carter Lake club and occupied by himself and tamily. Beside ton body was an empty vial which had contained carbolic acid.

Although a statement issued by Stack & Falconer, Omaha undertakers, who will take charge of the body, asserted that the death was accidental, a different view of the tragedy was taken at the office of Coroner Cutler of Council Bluffs, according to whose books Mr. Rawitzer met death "by taking carbolic acid. Carter Lake club is across the Iowa boundary line.

Stack & Falconer, undertakers, made the following statement: "Mr. Rawitzer had a bottle of peroxide, used as a gargle, resembling the bottle of carbolic acid. He kept these in the gurage so the baby would not get them. We think he accidentally got the wrong bottle."




