Finland Wiped Off the Olympic Map

PARIS, June 16.—Finland was wiped off the Olympic map today when the International Olympic congress adopted the German definition of an Olympic nation.

Under this definition Finland cannot enter as a separate nation. The opinion was expressed by some of the delegates that Finland is likely to withdraw entirely from the games rather than compete under the Russian flag.
