GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET Farmers Are Selling the Surplus

Wheat Rapidly.

HARVEST IS STARTED IN SOUTH

of Winter Wheat Weakening a

OMAHA. Neb. June 15.

In order to hold the price of wheat up around the present level a built leader with money and backbone must come to the front and give that grain the needed support on the weak spots. Lower prices are slated for wheat because of the fact that the new crop is being harvested in many sections of the southwest, together with the fact that farmers, generally speaking, are anxious to get rid of a pert of their surplus because of the knowledge that an early and heavy movement is assured, if the weather continues favorable. The market at Chicago, as well as in other sections, is oversoid. Not only have hedging sales of large size been put out in this market, but the average speculators, with the idea that prices are to sell lower, have given the market a good deal of bear attention, and their sales have amounted to many millions of bushels.

The spring wheat outlook is as good as was ever known, but the crop has only started to account for itself. There has been plenty of moisture in that section of the country, and there are some parts of the three spring wheat states where it is said there is enough moisture to carry the crop for several weeks, while in other parts it is said that rain will soon be needed. There is one statistician in the Chicago market who relieves that the combined spring and winter wheat crops will exceed 200,000,000 bushels, while there are others who are willing to wager that the 200,000,000-bushel level will never be reached.

There was quite a controversy yesterday over the condition of a cargo or two of Argentine corn that was received at Galveston. A New York house wired its western correspondent that the corn was out of condition, with some of it waist high.
