BURDIN LANDS RELATIVES

Provides Places for Them on Pay-roll of School Board.

TO COME BEFORE THE BOARD

School Authorities May Be Called Upon to Decide Just How Many Relatives a Member May Provide For.

That puzzling problem of how many relatives a school official should have appointed to positions he may be able to control may be solved at a special meeting of the Board of Education Thursday, when Member A. J. Burdin will find out whether more of his relatives and friends will be given positions by the school board. Justices will then be appointed and Burdin is ready to ask for a considerable share of these appointments, because he is running for the legislature and needs votes.

Mr. Burdin's son and daughter are now in the employ of the school district. His daughter was appointed to a position as stenographer at the Omaha High school shortly after Burdin came on the school board. His son holds a job under Duncan Finlayson, superintendent of school buildings.

There have been several members of the Board of Education who modestly refrained from asking favors for their friends, but when Burdin appeared he asserted the fact for the legislature his lack of modesty in this respect has been even more apparent.

One member of the Board of Education said he thought "Burdin had been given enough." This member said he would look askance at Burdin's request that some of his relatives and friends be put on the janitor pay-roll.

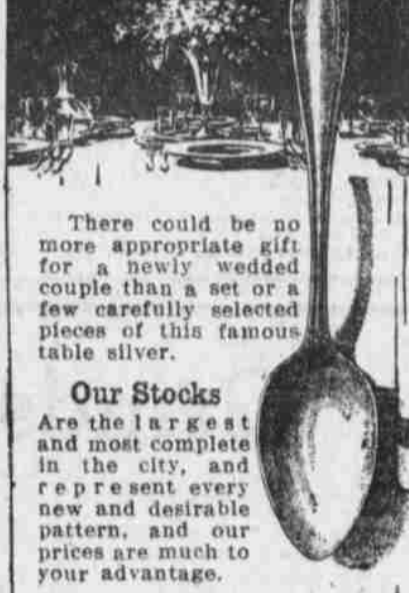
