JUDGES BECOME JUST KIDS

Venerable Justices of Supreme Bench and Brethren of Lesser Courts Mingle with the Bar in Relaxation.

Bench and bar took a day off in Omaha yesterday, and spent the afternoon and evening at the Field club in a "good fellowship" celebration.

President Thomas Wakefield Blackburn of the Omaha bar association was so uplifted by the occasion that he seized the opportunity to read a statement in which he criticized the Bee—although he did not name the paper—because its editor has had the temerity to call public attention to the conduct of some of the members of the local bar.

Introducing the speaker of the evening, President Henry H. Wilson of the State Bar association, Mr. Blackburn took occasion to eulogize the courts of the state and the lawyers by saying they were all without blemish.

Before closing the meeting Mr. Blackburn said he was about to read a statement which he felt voiced the sentiments of the people. He referred to criticisms "by a local paper" as "scurrilous, malicious and slanderous."

This meeting was attended by the supreme court justices. The following were guests of the association: Chief Justice Reese, Justices Hamner, Fawcett, Letton, Barnes, Rose, Sedgwick of the supreme court.

In the afternoon the lawyers young and old, this and that, declared their intention to be kids again and entered into all sorts of games.

A dinner was given in the evening at which President Blackburn was toastmaster. F. A. Brogan, H. H. Wilson and J. W. Woodrough were speakers.

Rine Can Practice in United States Supreme Court Now

City Attorney John A. Rine has been admitted to practice before the United States supreme court. He was admitted last week, while in Washington. He was greatly impressed by the occasion, in an interview in Washington, Mr. Rine said:

"I had to wait in the courtroom for nearly four hours before I was presented. But it was four hours of the most liberal education and four hours of the most intense interest to me as a lawyer I have ever experienced. To study the mastery way those great lawyers of the land handed down decisions, some of great moment and some involving matters almost insignificant, is a genuine treat to any deep student of the law."

"For some reason I was especially impressed with Chief Justice White, and with Justice Hughes and Pitney. The chief justice handed down decisions of vast importance without reference to his notes, and with a clearness and accuracy that was compelling to the listener, and of immense interest to a new member of the supreme court bar, as I am."

"The proceedings of the United States supreme court are inspiring to every American citizen."

Good Crop Weather is Prevailing Over State of Nebraska

Good crop weather prevails over the entire Northwestern system, according to reports received at headquarters here, and indications are that the harvest of wheat in Nebraska will start in the southern part of the state about June 25, which is somewhat earlier than usual. A few showers were reported from different districts over Nebraska, but none of them brought sufficient precipitation to damage wheat. While cloudy weather prevails over the entire state, there is little prospect for rain, according to Colonel Welsh of the weather bureau.

Young Woman is Martyr to Science

NEW YORK, June 19.—Miss Marion C. Mabie, 20 years old, died yesterday at her home in New Rochelle of diphtheria, a disease she had been working for eight months to combat by means of an anti-toxin. Miss Mabie became infected with diphtheria germs while experimenting in the laboratories of a hospital in this city. Her efforts to perfect an anti-toxin or serum which would make persons inoculated with it immune from diphtheria had been closely watched by leading physicians and bacteriologists.

ANOTHER EASTER TORNADO SUIT BEFORE THE JURY

If a tornado wipes out a building the very instant after the building was struck by lightning and set on fire can a jury determine the amount of damage done to the building exclusively by the fire? That fine point, a new one in law, was raised by the defendant in a suit before District Judge Troup, Martin Wig of Ralston is suing the Girard and American Fire Insurance companies on fire policies as the result of the lightning and tornado of Easter Sunday, 1913. The defendant moved that the case be taken from the jury. Judge Troup took the matter under advisement.
