Foreign Gold Coming to the United States for Wheat.

Genuine Bulls Are Scarce Bears Are in the Majority and They Are Hammering Prices Down From Notch to Notch and Selling Freely.

OMAHA, June 19, 1914.

The gold of the former is to come to our shores in exchange for the wheat that has been purchased. The continent has probably been the largest buyer of our cash grain. It was reported yesterday that one grain concern here that the makings in this market for export in two days amounted to over 1,000,000 bushels of wheat...

The number of genuine bulls in the Chicago wheat market might be counted on the fingers of one hand. There is an army of bears, and they have continued to hammer values until the situation now looks as if it will continue unchanged for some time to come.

The farmer is not selling his wheat as freely as was expected, and it looks as if those who want this grain will be obliged to wait for a while for the new crop moves in much larger quantities.

Corn was under fluctuation pressure yesterday, but it is not expected to be lower for the nearby futures, while the deferred were higher.

Provisions averaged a little higher. Red showed the most change, unchanged to one cent. Bacon advanced one cent, said to be against shipping sales of meats. The market closed steady.

Cash corn was unchanged to 1/4 cent lower. Cash oats were unchanged. Flour was 1/4 cent higher...

CHICAGO, June 19.—Big export business here and higher prices at Liverpool kept the wheat market today on the advance. The market was steady for most of the day, but the outcome in corn was a drop of 1/4 cent up, and for oats a rise of 1/4 cent.

Report sales of wheat here amounted to 500,000 bushels mainly old hard winter and there were 200,000 bushels of soft red winter wheat to go to Buffalo.

Although county acceptances were light on overnight bids for wheat to arrive, offerings increased materially on the bulge. The reaction against, however, was not of the impressive sort.

Reports that the leading bull sold out his July holdings. Besides cash demand, especially for the July 20-21, 1914, other hand, there was unwelcome dry weather in parts of the domestic belt...

For the most part, provisions were dull and easy. Hogs were a little higher, but were strengthened by a somewhat improved cash demand.

ATLANTA, Ga., June 19.—C. W. Burke, a Burns detective employed by attorneys for Leo M. Frank, today was indicted on a charge of attempted subornation of perjury. Burke is accused of having attempted to persuade Nellie Ferguson, a witness against Frank in his trial for the murder of Mary Phagan, to change her testimony. The attempt is alleged to have been made in connection with Frank's efforts to obtain a new trial. Burke was released on bond.
