STIEHM IS ON HIS VACATION

Dewey Harman Will Have Charge of the First Squad This Fall-No One Yet Selected to Succeed Dudley.

LINCOLN, June 20 .- (Special.) -- Coach Jumbo Stiehm, his wife and baby daughter left yesterday for Johnson Creek, Wis., where the Stiehms will spend the summer vacation, Stiehm will have plenty of opportunity to map out the season's work in football while sojourning in the Wisconsin woods.

Stiehm expects to spend considerable time in studyinly the rules during the summer but will keep in active touch with all of the football men. He will return to the city about September 1about a couple of week's in advance of the opening of school.

Most of the Nebraska gridiron heroes plan to spend the summer working in the harvest fields, developing a little additional brawn. All of the regulars will keep in training as much as possible and expect to be able to start out with active practice just as soon as the Missouri Valley rules permit with the opening of registration next September.
